CULINARY CONCEITS.

The oftener soup is strained the clearer it becomes. An old napkin serves very well for a strainer.

When stewing prunes, add one or two spoonfuls of red currant jelly to the water in which the prunes are stewed.

A tablespoonful of sugar added to the water for basting roast beef will give a rich brown color as well as fine flavor. · An innovation for the table is boiled lettuce. Boil the lettuce until tender, serve the whole head and dress with butter, pepper and salt.

To prevent tomato soup from curdling add the tomato before the milk is put in, and remember to strain the tomato juice before turning it over the flower and butter.

Some very admirable cooks greatly simplify cake making by putting all the ingredients, even the eggs, together and making one long and vigorous beating do for the whole.

Egg Tonic.

A raw egg is an excellent tonic and is very strengthening. If prepared in the following way it is really a delicious drink: Put the yolk of an egg into a dish with a teaspoonful of white sugar and a teaspoonful of orange or lemon juice and beat lightly together with a fork. Put the white on a plate and add a ninch of salt. Then with a broad add a pinch of sait. Then with a broad bladed knife beat it to a stiff froth. Now, as lightly as possible, mix all together in the dish, then as lightly transfer it to a clean tumbler, which it will nearly fill if properly made. It must not stand in a warm place, as it oon becomes liquid and loses its snow; look. Any fruit juice may be used in place of orange or lemon.

To Extract a Splinter. A bit of home surgery, stated to have been practiced when a splinter is driven into a child's hand particularly deep, is its extraction by steam. A bottle with a sufficiently wide mouth is filled twothirds with very hot water, and the mouth of the bottle is placed under the injured spot. The suction draws the flesh down when a little pressure is used, and the steam in a moment or two extracts inflammation and splinter together.
