

RUNNING THE GANTLET.

This Punishment Was Once Used For

The following extracts give information concerning the punishment of "running the gantlet:" "In running the gantlepe the regi-ment was formed six deep, and the ranks opened and faced inward. Each

man being furnished with a switch, the offender, naked to the waist, was led through the ranks, preceded by a ser-geant, the point of whose reversed hal-bert was presented to his breast to pre-vent his running too fast. As he thus passed through the ranks every soldier gave him a stroke."—Grose's "Military Antiquities," volume 2, page 108, But the oldest notice I have seen is given in "Monro—His Expedition With

the Worthy Scots Regiment (called Mackeyes Regiment), Levied In August, 1626, Etc. London. Printed by William Jones In Red-Crosse Streete, 1637:"

"Other slight punishments we enjoyne for slight faults, put in execution by their camarades, as the loupe-garthe (running the gantlet; Swedish gantulopp, to run through a hedge made by soldiers), when a souldier is stripped naked above the waste and is made to runne a furlong betwixt 200 souldiers ranged alike opposite to others, leaving a space in the midst for the souldier to runne through, where his camarades whip him with small rods ordained and cut for the purpose by the Gavilliger (provost marshal), and all to keepe good order and discipline."-London Notes and Queries.
