## CANADIAN FORESTRY.

Mr. Wilfrid Laurier Issues a Call for a Convention in Ottawa on 10th, 11th and 12th January, 1906.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—From the office of the Prime Minister of Canada the following has just been issued: To the Public of the Dominion of Canada.

Canada possesses one of the largest areas of virgin forest of any country in the world and is ranked by European experts first, or among the first, of the important sources of the world's timber supply for the future.

The preservation of the streams in perennial and constant flow, which is largely controlled by the forests on the watersheds, will have an important influence on the industrial and agricultural development of the Dominion. The expansion of our electrical and mechanical industries will be regulated to a great extent by water, which forms the greatest source of power in all countries, and some of our western districts are dependent on irrigation to ensure the success of agricultural operations.

In all the older provinces the clearing of the soil has been carried to such an extent that the ill effects on the water supply and on agriculture are clearly marked, while on the western prairies the need of sheltering trees for houses and fields is seriously felt by the settlers.

The early construction of the Transcontinental Railway, and of other railways, through our northern forested districts and the consequent opening of those districts to general traffic, will increase the danger from fire which has already been a most active agent of destruction.

These conditions are not new; they have from time to time received public attention, and during the session just closed Parliament authorized the summoning of a convention for the more thorough discussion of the same.

I therefore hereby call a public convention to meet in the City of Ottawa on the 10th, 11th and 12th of January, 1906, under the auspices of the Canadian Forestry Association, and to this convention are specially invited: Members of the Senate and House of Commons, Lieutenant-Governors of the provinces, members of Legislative Councils and Legislative Assemblies of the provinces, Dominion and Provincial Forest officials, members of the Canadian Forestry Association, representatives of lumbermen's associations, representatives of Boards of Trade, representatives of universities, representatives of agricultural colleges, representatives of farmers' institutes, representatives of railway companies, representatives of the Canadian Mining Institute, representatives of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, representatives of associations of land surveyors, representatives of fish and game associations, and all others who take an interest in forestry.

An invitation was also extended to the Bureau of Forestry of the United States, the American Forestry Association, and the State Forestry Bureau and Associations to send representatives to this convention.

The subjects to be considered at the convention will be discussed under the following divisions:

1. The Nation and the Forest.
2. Forestry in relation to Agriculture and Irrigation.
3. The Forest and the Lumber and Pulp Industries.
4. The Relation of our Forests to our other Industries: Railways; Water Powers; Mining; Building Trades; Wood Working Manufactures.
5. Scientific Forestry and Forestry Education.

## TO SUPPRESS FISH POACHERS.

United States Government Is Now Lending a Hand.

Detroit, Oct. 7.—The United States revenue cutter, Morrill left Detroit Thursday night, having on board a collector of Customs, Leach, and a license to investigate the cargo of any fishing boat he comes upon, and any fisherman found guilty of violating the customs law by failure to enter his catch in Canadian waters will be arrested, his cargo and vessel seized, and proceedings of confiscation instituted by the collector.

This puts the poachers between two fires, with both Governments being arrayed against them. It is believed that the latest turn of affairs will largely put a stop to the wholesale taking of fish in Canadian waters by United States fishermen.

In his letter of instructions, Secretary Shaw of the Treasury Department said: "The relations between the United States and Canada are of the most cordial character, and it is regretted that any of our people will violate both the laws of their own country and of Canada."

## Edhem Pasha Dead.

London, Oct. 7.—A despatch from Constantinople yesterday announced the death of Pasha Edhem, who was commander-in-chief of the victorious Turkish army in the war with Greece, and who also distinguished himself during the defence of Plevna against the Russians in 1876.

## Five Men Remanded.

Ingersoll, Oct. 7.—The five men arrested on the charge of murdering the late Isiah Wright, were up before Police Magistrate Morrison yesterday afternoon. Owing to the inquest not being completed, the Crown asked that the prisoners be remanded for a week. The request was granted.

## St. Paul a Total Wreck.

Eureka, Cal., Oct. 7.—Past upon the rocks, a mile and a half south of Point Gorda, the San Francisco & Portland Co.'s steamer St. Paul, Capt. Crandall, lies a total wreck. Its ninety-three passengers and crew of sixty-five men are safe.

## BIG C. P. R. LAND SYNDICATE.

Has Been Formed in London—Mr. Preston's Narrow Escape.

London, Oct. 7.—(C. A. P.)—The Canadian Associated Press understands a big London syndicate has been formed to retail Canadian Pacific land. It is stated to have bought 900,000 acres of C. P. R. land at Edmonton. The shares in this syndicate are stated to be already largely over-subscribed and could not be obtained for money by influential buyers in the city on Wednesday evening.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—C. P. R. officials seen yesterday afternoon stated that no big block of land had been sold to any British syndicate. A director stated emphatically that the company was disposing of land to settlers only.
