OFFICIAL STORY OF BATTLE.

Mutineers Lost Heavily In the Engagement at Sebastopol.

gagement at Sebastopol.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—The Admirality announces that it has received from Gen. Kaulbars, Governor-General of Odessa, the following telegram addressed to him by Vice-Admiral Chouknin, at Sebastopol, dated Nov. 29:

We wished to terminate the affair on Nov. 28 by surrounding the mutinous divisions with troops, and issuing an ultimatum for unconditional surrender. The mutineers, however, commenced to attack on the night of Nov. 27, seizing the torpedo boat Svirepol. 27, seizing the torpedo boat Svirepol, and three others which had drawn near the cruiser Otchakoff.

near the cruiser Otchakon.

All these vessels hoisted red flags, after which the Otchakoff flew the signal that Lieut. Schmidt was in con mand of the fleet. Then the fleutenant, who was on board the Svirepoi, sailed along the squadron, his crews cheering but the other vessels did not respond to these cheers. Lieut. Schmidt afterwards proceeded to the port and released those who had been arrested under his orders. under his orders.

Armed detachments of mutineers con

tinued to seize the small craft in the harbor, which were not guarded by

Armed parties in sloops from the Ot-chakoff went to the Panteleimon, on which there were no arms, captured the officers and took them on board the Otehakoff Otchakoff. We were compelled to tolerate such

We were compelled to tolerate such doings inasmuch as the fleet had been disarmed in view of the dangerous attitude of the sailors.

One after another the craft on the

eastern shore of the southern bay were seized by the mutineers and red flags

seized by the mutineers and red mags hoisted.

Theaplan which was first proposed was abandoned, and it was resolved to adopt energetic measures to prevent the situation from becoming worse.

Mutineers' Strategy.

The officers captured by the mutineers were taken on board the Otchakoff in the belief that there presence on that vessel would prevent fire being opened on it. Lieut. Schmidt informed the assembled officers that he would hang them if the troops on shore took action.

At 3 30 o'clock on te afternoon of Nov. 29, fire was opened by field ar-

At 350 o'clock on the afternoon of Nov. 29, fire was opened by field artillery on the ships in the southern harbor flying red flags. These flags were immediately lowered and Lieut. Schmidt signalled "I have many capture officers." ture officers.

The Otchakoff then opened fire, to which the north shore battery and the which the north shore battery and the loyal ships, whose breech blocks had been restored, replied. The Svirepoi advanced to the attack, but was met with a strong fire from two cruisers, the Captain Sacken and the Pamya. Merkurlya, and from the battleship

The Svirepol was immediately put The Sylrepol was immediately put out of action, as were also two other torpedo boats, one of which stank.

The Otchakoff had fired barely stands when she hoisted the white flag and the squadron ceased to fire.

A conflagration broke out on the

Otchakoff, and boats were sent to rescue the survivors and to transfer those who had been wounded.

Escaped, But Was Caught.
Lieut Schmidt, who was dressed as
common sallor, escaped but was arrested later.

When the firing began a mining ves-

sel, which had on board 300 mines, fearing an explosion, was sunk by her

commander.
Capt. Slavotschinsky, commanding
the seventh naval corps, started for
the mining ship, but was severely
wounded on the way.
During the fight against the Otchakoff, the field batteries bombarded
the naval barracks, which replied.
The number of wounded has not
been ascertained.

The Otchakoff is still burning and it is impossible to extinguish it. Gen. Kaulbars telegraphed later that he had just received a telegram from Capt. Bergel, chief of Admiral Chouknin's staff, saying that during the night about 1,500 mutineers surrendered, with ten quick-firing guas, to the Brest Regiment and that the

barracks were eccupied by treops.

Gen. Kaulbars also forwarded an additional despatch
Chouknin, saying that the barracks in which the mutineers had defended themselves had been occupied by the

Gen Kaulbars' despatch says that the mutineers who surrendered together with those captured en the Otcha-kon number 2,006, the majority of them being reservists who were sent to the barracks at the time of the mutiny.
