LONDON STRIKE REPORTED SETTLED

Exchange Telegraph Says Strike of Policemen Brought to End.
London, Aug. 31.—The strike of members of the London police force has been settled, according to an announcement made this evening by the Exchange Telegraph.

Mr. David Lloyd George to-day received a deputation of the London police strikers. After the conference it was announced that proposals had been made in behalf of the Government.

London, Aug. 31.—The strike of London policemen spread virulently throughout the night and today a majority of the 22,000 constables had joined in the movement. The City of London police joined the men of the Metropolitan Police last night and only a few members of the night shift, which come on duty at six o'clock, appeared on the streets.

The London police force is one of the most thorough and efficient of all the great cities of the world, but one might walk for miles to-day without the sight of the familiar helmet and blue uniform. Comparatively few special constables responded to the call to take the policemen's places and as a consequence the city is practically unguarded. That London is one of the most orderly of cities is proved by the absence of the policemen from their beats.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN KILLED
Amsterdam, Aug. 31.—Mosés Urtizky, Peoples Commissary for Home Affairs at Petrograd, has been assassinated. The assassins, according to Russian advices received through Berlin, were arrested.

BOLSHEVIKI FLEE
After Defeat in Battle on Ussuri River—Fight in Battle on Ussuri River—Fight Against White Guards.

London, Aug. 31.—Daily Mail's Harbin, Manchuria, correspondent, telegraphing recently regarding the situation in Siberia, says the Bolshevik forces were defeated in a three-day battle along the Ussuri river, losing 400 men killed. The correspondent adds that the Bolshevik troops are fleeing towards Khabarovsk, and that the Japanese have occupied Iman, midway between Nikola and Khabarovsk.

Tokio, Aug. 30.—Monday—There has been severe fighting between Entente Allied forces and Bolshevik Red Guards on the Ussuri river front along the Manchurian border. The Japanese casualties in the last few days numbered 170, including officers.

London, Aug. 31.—A Russian wire less dispatch received here today from Moscow says:
"A resolute struggle is going on against the White Guards. The organizer of the recently discovered company at Moscow, named Marpulis, has been shot. Near the church of Christ the Savior, a band of White Guards was captured during the night."

The author, Peshechnoff, formerly editor of a newspaper at Petrograd, has been set free at Moscow.

In the Ukraine, the unrest among the peasants is spreading. The district and town of Dnyprop, 24 miles from Kiev, has been declared by the German army commander to be a state of siege. All persons were forbidden to be in the streets after 7 p.m., and all movements to and from the town were prohibited.

"The population of Kiev is starving."

FIRST AID CONTESTS AT CUMBERLAND

Minister of Mines Will Visit Cumberland Land on Monday For Mine Rescue Competitions.

Hon. William Sloan, Minister of Mines, was in the city over the weekend and tomorrow will attend the annual meeting of the Vancouver Island Mine Safety Association, which will be held at Cumberland land.

The competitions this year promise to be exceedingly keen both in mine rescue and in first aid work. It is known that there are two mine rescue teams and four first aid teams entered from Nanaimo, the members of which are of the Canadian Western Fuel Company, while from Ladysmith there will be at least two mine rescue teams and one first aid team. In addition Cumberland and other island mining centres will be represented.

It is expected that the struggle for Government and privately presented cups, with their accompanying medals, will be chiefly between the men of the Western Fuel and Canadian Collieries.

For the mine rescue features the Judges will be Inspector of Mines J. Bagley, of the State of Washington; W. H. Sanderson, Mine Safety Engineer and Western Manager of the Mines Safety Appliance Company, with headquarters at Seattle, Wash., and George Wilkinson, Chief Inspector of Mines for British Columbia. Qualified British Columbia medical men and surgeons will judge the first aid contests.
