

Nanaimo possesses substantial barrack buildings which could berth 1,000 men. Winter climate admirably suited for winter training-ground for trenching available and also large training area. The selection of Nanaimo as a training camp would give added stimulus to recruiting and in this regard I would say that new companies of recruits are leaving as fast as they can be enrolled and re ceive preliminary training.
