TROOPS AT NANAIMO.

We wish to point out that the small garrison maintained here has been a potent factor in securing the considerable number of recruits already enlisted here, of the very class most useful and effective in trench warfare, and strongly urge that the increasing of the garrison and the extension of the camp for training purposes now here will vastly stimulate recruiting of this most desirable class.

We trust that these important facts will have due consideration in the placing of garrisons in this province, and that in the establishment of concentration and training camps, the manifold advantages of the city and district, and the accruing benefits to the service will be fully and fairly considered, and our just rights not be overlooked, and in the final disposition, that Nanaimo will be selected as the most suitable point on the island for a general training camp.

The action of the Board of Trade in the matter was set forth in a telegram to the Militia Department, which reads as follows:

The action taken by the Council and Board of Trade has been supplemented by the local Dominion member Mr. F. H. Shepherd who has wired the department as follows:
Maj.-Gen. the Hon. Sir Sam Hughes, Ottawa, Ont.

By resolution Mayor and City Council and Board of Trade, strongly urge that Nanaimo be selected as one of the military centres for training military forces for overseas service.

It is further urged that the explosive works, the collieries and wharves and lines of transportation be continued to be guarded.

Nanaimo possesses substantial barracks buildings which could berth 1,000 men. Winter climate admirably suited for winter training-ground for trenching available and also large training area. The selection of Nanaimo as a training camp would give added stimulus to recruiting and in this regard I would say that new companies of recruits are leaving as fast as they can be enrolled and receive preliminary training.

I therefore strongly support the petition of the Mayor and Council and Board of Trade and trust that you will give the request your early and favorable consideration. Resolution in full follows by mail.

COUNCIL DECIDES QUESTION

ment on Haliburton street in this city. The work has been done at a cost of \$6.10 per foot frontage, and a complaint has been made by the property owners, that the cost of the work is more than they can afford to pay, and they have asked the Council to afford them relief, by levying a rate on the whole city to pay the cost of grading the street preparatory to the laying down the pavement.

At the initial meeting of the Court of Revision held this morning, I was directed to communicate with you to ask your opinion if this could be done as the matter now stands; that is, to amend the Construction By-law, so as to comply with the request of the property owners.

I enclose a copy of the original by-

law and the members of the Court of Revision will be glad if you would kindly favor them with your opinion on this matter by Thursday's afternoon mail as the Court of Revision has adjourned until Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

Dear Sir,—I have your letter of the 8th ultimo, and in reply would advise that if it is desired to meet the wishes of the ratepayers affected by the construction of a pavement on Haliburton street as a local improvement in the manner indicated in your letter the steps already taken in this matter must be repealed and a new procedure commenced.

In view of the possibility of this course being adopted I am forwarding under separate cover a draft form of repealing bylaw, and also form of determining bylaw with reference to the new procedure. The repealing bylaw should be duly passed and reconsidered and become effective by registration in the County Court before any action is taken with the determining bylaw.

Should your Council decide to proceed in this manner I shall be glad to furnish you with draft notices and bylaws so that the procedure can be carried along without any unnecessary delay.

Second Letter to Inspector

Dear Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 1st inst., and thank you for your kind attention.

Growing out of my previous letter to you, the members of the Court of Revision, desire me to ask you a further question.

The contemplated change in the special assessment for the work done on Haliburton street means that the entire cost of the grading shall be borne by the city, and the members of the Court of Revision want to know if they can change the special assessment on other streets on which paving work has been done or is in progress.

Debentures have been sold and delivered, to pay the cost of paving Wallace, Front, Skinner and Macleary streets, and the special assessments have been settled by the Court of Revision; can a change now be made in the special assessment to make the cost of the grading of these

streets a charge against the City, and thus reduce the cost of the owners share,

Inspector's Reply.
Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of your letter of September 3rd, and in reply I beg to say that, in the matter of local improvement assessment rolls when the Court of Revision has passed upon the assessment roll its jurisdiction ceases and the roll becomes final, except in so far as it may be altered upon appeal to a judge of the Court or a to a Court of Appeal, as the case may be. When the orders of the judge or of the Court of Appeal have been carried out, or when the time for making appeals has elapsed without any such appeals being entered, there can be no further readjustment of the assessments except in cases specially provided for, as in section 133 of the Municipal Act.

In moving the adoption of the committee's report Ald. Forrester remarked the Council could afford relief to the ratepayers of Haliburton and Nicol streets before the Court of Revision met, but such action would not be fair to the ratepayers of other streets being paved, viz Wallace, Front, Skinner and Macleary, whose assessments could not be changed except on appeal to a judge. The judge, however, could not deal with the question being dealt with as his power only allowed him to deal with matters arising out of a Court of Revision.

In reply to Ald. McKenzie who asked why the committee had included Nicol street in its report if not being a street to be paved, Ald. Forrester stated the committee was considering the general principle of street grading and the Nicol street grading had not been considered by a Court of Revision.

Ald. Forrester's motion was seconded by Ald. Busby and adopted by the Council.

At the close of the Council meeting the Court of Revision met to hear appeals against the assessments in connection with the paving of Haliburton street and the grading of Nicol street, and in view of the action taken by the Council had no alternative but to let the assessments stand.
