HOT WEATHER.—On Monday the thermometer was as high as 91° in the shade; the highest known here to the oldest inhabitant.

L. O. O. F.—A Lodge of Good Templars, "Faithful," No. 47, was instituted at Moncton, on Tuesday week last, by G. W. C. T. John Menham.

BANK BILLS.—The I. C. Railway refuses to take bills of the Farmer's Bank of Bastico.—Acadia Bank bills are being circulated. Look out for them.

NEW COPPER DISCOVERY.—A new and what promises to be a very valuable deposit of copper has been discovered near Ross' Lake, Guysboro' County.

A FESTIVAL takes place on the parsonage grounds, Westport, on Tuesday, to obtain funds to repair the fence, &c., about the Westport graveyard. All the luxuries of the season, will be provided.

THE METHODIST S. S. P. CHURCH yesterday at Fort Cumberland was attended by about 2000 children and teachers, from Moncton, Dorchester, Sackville, Amherst, Westmorland. The affair passed off very pleasantly.

MONCTON SCHOOL BOARD.—The Government of this Province have chosen for the position of Trustees of Schools for Moncton the following gentlemen: Jas. McAllister, N. H. Whitney, and John L. Harris the first-named to be chairman.

NEW BRUNSWICK PEARLS.—Mr. S. E. Gerow, of St. John, found on Wednesday last at New River, Charlotte County, fifteen pearls, some of them very fine. One of them is as large as a large pea, and is pronounced by an expert to be worth at least \$100. The pearls were found in the fresh water clam which abounds in New River.

A SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT occurred at St. Stephen on Tuesday, by which two children of a Mr. Stanhope, of Calais, were drowned. The children were brother and sister. The boy had gone out on a log to catch minnows, when he fell off, and his little sister, in an attempt to save her drowning brother, rushed into the water and got beyond her depth. Both were drowned.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—The new chapel at Upper Aboussang was struck by lightning on Monday afternoon, and caused damage to the amount of about \$50. Among four of the carpenters at work, three were knocked senseless for a while. The fire also caught in a pile of shavings but was put out without much difficulty.

THE PRESS.—The second number of the *Printer's Miscellany* has been received. It is handsomely got up at the office of the St. John Telegraph, and is brim full of news and information interesting to the craft. H. Finley, Editor.—The *Christian Standard* is a neat religious publication. Rev. Chas. B. Woodcock, is Editor; and Messrs. McMillan publishers. It is congregational, evangelical but not sectarian.

LAND SALES.—The farm and mill of C. W. Oulton of Bedford, insolvent, were sold to Harvey Oulton at auction by the assignee last week for \$2,000, subject to claims for about \$4,000. Marsh belonging to Estate of the late L. Dixon was sold on Monday and was purchased by C. Milner for \$5,000. This was also subject to certain claims. The Sackville Cheese Factory was put up at auction on Monday at an upset price of \$500, but found no bidders. This Factory has of late paid many dividends, and is at present closed up.

General News.

STARTLING.—There are forty thousand workmen in New York with nothing to do.

THE IRON BRIDGE over Chaudiere Slides was seized yesterday for non-payment duty on importation.

The vacation of Common Schools has been permanently extended to four weeks, (20 teaching days.)

NEW SHIPPING at CHARLOTTETOWN. P. E. I.—During June and July, 21 vessels of 3710 tons were registered.

THOMAS COSTENTENUS, a prominent business man of Wilkesbarre, is reported a forger to the amount of \$200,000, and has fled.

FISHERMEN'S crew from Halifax expect to leave for Centennial on Monday. Their new English boat is called the "King Fisher."

The Quebec Loan of five millions in London Market at 87 1/2 issued yesterday. The Times severely attacks it.

GREAT Forest Fires are raging at New River and Lepreau, also about Westfield. Timber lands are suffering severely.

In a race in Buffalo, on 8rd, Goldsmith Maid took first money, making the best three consecutive heats on record—2.16, 2.15 1-4, 2.15. Smugler was unmanageable.

A valuable deposit of magnesian limestone, has been found at North Mountain Annapolis by Prof. McDonald. Portland cement and manure are made from it.

RELIGIOUS.—The Bishop of Nova Scotia confirmed 53 at Kentville and 50 at New Ross a few days ago.

Rev. A. McGroarty of Yarmouth was presented with \$500 in gold by a few friends.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK Railway Co. intend extending their road to Grand Falls next year. They are going to establish a new settlement in connection with Tilley Settlement, Victoria County.

ECONOMY is understood in the United States Senate. They cannot stand millions, but as a set-off, they propose to reduce the pension of the wife of Custer from \$50 to \$30 per month!

A RAILWAY GRIEVANCE FOR THE MONCTON TIMES.—It is said that when Bardum's show was leaving Amherst on Thursday last, the Railway authorities there actually refused to check the Elephant trunk to Moncton. Let the Times show up this new indignity.—Com.

A ROW ON SHIPBOARD AND DEATH.—There was some trouble among the sailors on the bark "Leopard" as she was towed out of St. John harbor on Monday afternoon, and one man, pursued by others, jumped overboard, and was drowned when the vessel was off Reed's Point.

THE TWO TELLERS who were in charge at time of robbery have been discharged from Bank of Nova Scotia. The acting cashier has resigned. Hampton and Watson's examination is proceeding slowly. They were taken to a photographic gallery, but by persistent contortions succeeded in preventing pictures being taken. It is rumored that \$20,000, Nova Scotia bills, have been offered in New York.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—That destructive pest, the army worm, has made its appearance on the Island. On Saturday night, as the steamer "Alpha" was nearing Charlottetown, a smothered cry was heard eastern of the vessel, and it was soon found that a man had fallen overboard. A boat was launched and efforts were made to rescue him, but in vain. The man belonged to Murray's Circus.

Late accounts from the fishermen along the coast are very discouraging.

NEWCASTLE, Aug. 9.—On Saturday, Justice Fairley, lumber merchant on the Southwest, procured from the Bank of Montreal \$1,500 in three parcels of \$500 each. Wrapping up the cash he deposited it in the boot of his wagon and proceeded home. He made a halt at Chris. Parker's, Derby, where he took money from wagon, placed it in his coat upon a bed and went out for a few moments. When he returned the coat was disturbed, the parcel open at one end, and \$500 missing. Officers are on the thief's track, but no account as yet of cash.—Globe.

CIRCUS ITEMS.—MURPHY'S Circus performed at Shediac on Monday. On Monday evening last, when "the circus" was in Truro, the look-out of that town contained sixty-two prisoners who were arrested as drunk and disorderly.

A Recorder correspondent thus concludes about the Bank robbery:—So many things seemed requisite to render such a feat practicable that I cannot believe it was performed by a stranger, unless he had an accomplice who prepared the way and gave the signal to go ahead.

Eastern War.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—There is more talk about an armistice in the Serbian struggle.

Despair reigns in Belgrade. The foreign Consuls are removing the archives to places of safety. The richer families are leaving town.

The disaster to the Servians was complete.

Gen. Leachjanin was routed and forced to abandon Satschar.

Osaka Paoha is marching to Chupria, from which point the road is open to Belgrade.

Russian volunteers are arriving to rescue Servia.

The Turks are burning and destroying everything in their butchery. Preparations are being made for a complete abandonment of Satschar. The families are ordered to the interior.

A Constantinople special says an official despatch to the Government has the following: Gurgosovatz was taken Saturday. The Turks stormed the Serbian redoubt and, after a severe battle, penetrated the town, driving the Servians before them.

The latter remained with guns and material. Gurgosovatz was set on fire, and many buildings burned.

The early fall of Satschar is confidently expected. The main Serbian army is retreating on Posatchin, the troops much disheartened by recent reverses, and greatly demoralized.

THE KIRBY MOWER.—John Fawcett, Esq., of this place, having noticed the two wheel Kirby Mower in the Agricultural Exhibition in Dublin last autumn, and being favorably impressed with it, he imported one a few weeks ago, and has since been operating it. It has several peculiarities, among which is, the line of draft is direct on the cutting apparatus, and there is no loss of power; it has very light draft; the bar can be folded without stopping the team or the driver leaving his seat; the points of the guards can be raised or lowered while the machine is in motion; the steel plates are not riveted, but bolted to the bar; there is no side draft or weight on the horses' necks. It is the only machine in the Province. Mr. Fawcett's experience with it so far is highly satisfactory. It does its work easily and well, and from appearances promises to become one of our leading machines.
