Toronto, June 30.—Moderate depressions are situated over the Gulf of St. Lawrence and in the western provinces, while pressure is now here much about the normal. Showers and thunder storms have been general in Quebec and New Brunswick and they have also occurred in many portions of Ontario. In the west, with the exception of a few light showers, the weather has been fairly fine.

American Forester Here. Major David T. Mason, of the timber section of the bureau of Internal Revenue of Washington, D. C., and A. T. Death of Fred Biden. The death occurred this morning at his home at Lower St. Mary's of Fred Biden, one of the best known and most highly respected residents of that place. Deceased was 48 years of age and had been in failing health for some time, but had only been confined to his bed for the past week. Interment to be made in the churchyard at Lower St. Mary's.

JAMAICA GINGER AND LIQUOR SEIZED IN MINING TOWNS

Inspector Fraser Saunders Made Clean Up Tuesday in Queens County

"JAKEY" IS EVIDENTLY POPULAR AT CHIPMAN

C. N. R. Station Agent Fined for Refusing to Produce Books for Inspection

Liquor Sub-inspector Fraser D. Saunders returned last evening from a trip to Minto and Chipman, where he had been investigating reported liquor selling. As a result of his trip he secured three convictions before Magistrate Baird at Chipman and fines amounting to \$150 were imposed. Thirty cases of Jamaica ginger were seized at Chipman from one person and forty bottles of the same "nervonic" were seized from another resident of that community. Both were fined \$50 and costs.

Six cases of liquor were seized from foreigners at Minto and were brought to this city last evening by the inspector for storage purposes. The C. N. R. station agent at Chipman was summoned before Magistrate Baird and fined \$50 for refusing to allow the inspector to look over his books.

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\$2.20 TAX RATE FOR FREDERICTON ANNOUNCED TODAY

The Official Announcement of This Year's Tax Rate Was Made Today

OUTSIDE DISTRICT RATE IS MADE \$1.80

New Valuation of Property in Fredericton Shows Total of \$9,792,858

Fredericton's tax rate for 1920 has been fixed at \$2.20, which is a 10 per cent. advance over the 1919 rate. The rate which Chief Assessor A. A. Sterling and his assistants have worked out will no doubt be accepted as most satisfactory by the citizens, particularly in view of predictions which were made some time ago that the rate would be as much as \$2.50.
