**Selected Matter.**

**A Catholic Bishop in a Presbyterian University.**

Bishop Clancy, of Kingston, occupied a seat on the platform at a recent Convocation banquet in Queen's University in that city, and delivered a stirring address, which the festive gladness of the several Faculties on the occasion of decorating their students with titles of honor. He concurred in the sentiment expressed by another speaker, that no man of cultivated feeling could regard with indifference the efforts of young men for the improvement of their minds in the various departments of study and their preparation for the duties that should hereafter devolve upon them when they take their place in society.

He assured the Principal that when ever he came to meet one of those young men in the streets of Kingston wearing the academic cap and gown, his heart would be warmed to him, and his mind turned with pleasant remembrance to the days of his own college life, when he knew nothing of the solitudes and troubles that he was to encounter.

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**Great Fire in Oil Tanks.**

JENNETT CITY, N. J., May 10.—The Standard Oil Works, at Cavan Point, struck by lightning during a storm this morning and several tanks exploded in succession, the contents of the tanks being destroyed.

Another dispatch says: There are 38 tanks in all. The stock of several tank boats and 100 feet of trestle work are also destroyed. The firemen hastened to the scene, but could do little. Several persons, narrowly escaped injury. The people in the vicinity are moving out of their homes. Danger to the shipping is anticipated. Thus far 500,000 barrels of oil are destroyed. The works are the most extensive in the country. About half the property is destroyed. One of the large tanks was first struck and exploded, the lightning struck the tank and poured down like an angry river and down the avenue between the rows of enormous tanks. The explosion communicated to three huge tanks and they exploded simultaneously with terrific force.

A new remedy for the headache has been found by Dr. Haley, an Australian physician. He says that for some time he has found that a minimum dose of iodine of potassium, of great service in frontal headache; that is, a heavy, dull headache, accompanied by languor, chilliness, and a feeling of general discomfort, and distaste for food, which sometimes approaches to vomiting, can be completely removed by a two grain dose dissolved in half a wineglassful of water, and this quantity, he says, is the whole quantity of iodine of potassium required. In many cases, he adds, the effect of these small doses has been simply wonderful. For instance, a person who, for some time, has been unable to eat or sleep, and who is suffering from a headache, would now take a good meal and resume his wonted cheerfulness.

**Domestic Parliament.**

Ottawa, May 21.—The bill authorizing subsidies for the construction of certain lines of railway was read a second and third time and passed.

On motion of Sir J. T. Tilley, the House went into committee to consider the resolution respecting a loan to the St. John Bridge and Railway Extension Company. He explained the great advantage to general railway traffic which would be secured by the construction of the proposed line, and that it was intended to be built on the line of the direct railway via St. John, the saving in time which it would effect would be a matter of the greatest importance. Added to this, there was the advantage to shippers of fish by this proposed crossing, who would thereby be enabled to reach the American markets in much less time than by present arrangements.

The following bills were read a third time and passed:—Act to encourage the construction of pig iron in Canada from Canadian ore; Act to amend the tariff of duties of customs; Act to continue for a limited time the duties on certain goods; Act to provide for salaries and superannuation and travelling allowances of certain Judges of certain Provincial Courts; Act relating to bills of exchange and promissory notes in the Province of Prince Edward Island; Act to amend the law respecting lotteries.

After recess, the House went into committee on the liquor bill, McDonald (Cape Breton) in the chair. On clause 31, which provides that no license shall be granted if a majority of the electors of a sub-division petition against it, Sir J. T. Tilley moved the clause. He argued that the people themselves were the best judges of their own wants and the principle, at least of the clause, should become law.

Robertson (Hamilton), Fisher, Mitchell and Orton spoke against the clause.

Sir John suggested that instead of a bare majority the clause should be amended so that power to vote license be given to two thirds.

Tilley said that in the interests of temperance, he would like to see the amendment inserted. He had learned by experience that it is no use to move in a locality where sympathies of the people are not with the movement. When Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick, he had written a letter to a convention in Montreal, advocating that the decision be left to three fifths. He also favored an open vote as a more satisfactory means of ascertaining popular feeling. He had had experience in the matter of prohibition, and thirty years ago, he introduced a prohibition law in New Brunswick, which law he hoped to see carried in Canada.

After considerable discussion, the amendment passed on division.

On the 46th clause, preventing the issue of any license in any municipality where a petition against such license, signed by a majority of the electors, has been presented, Sir J. T. Tilley moved the amendment.

McCarthy expressed himself willing to accept the amendment.
