MUTTON SUET AS A HOUSEHOLD REMEDY.

It is very vexing and annoying, indeed, to have one's lips break out with cold sores, but, like the measles, it is far better to strike out than to strike in. A drop of warm mutton suet applied to the sores at night, just before retiring, will soon cause them to disappear. This is a very excellent remedy for parched lips and chapped hands. It should be applied at night in the liquid state, and be well rubbed and heated in before a brisk fire, which often causes a smarting sensation, but the roughness will disappear. Small quantities for family use can be stored in shoe or other boxes, from the bottom at each end and side of the box, says the "Orchard and Garden." Turn the box on end, and pack the celery in layers, the narrow way of the box. To each layer of celery in position sprinkle the roots only enough water to match them well. Continue until the box is full. When you set the box down shake or jar the box to settle the dirt among the roots of the plants. Then take a watering pot with nozzle and pour water through the sugar holes at the ends until the soil is thoroughly saturated and is done. The box can be set in any convenient niche of the cellar, and only needs occasional watering (always through the sugar holes) to have a supply of crisp tender celery throughout the winter, without the trouble of grubbing in the frozen ground and exposing both yourself and the whole lot of celery in the trench.

RAISE SHEEP.

Most every farmer is aware of the fact that sheep must be fed to make the best mutton, but few conceive the idea that a properly and well-fed sheep produces more and better wool than a poorly fed and cared for. Wool is a product from feeding, just the same as fat or flesh, and the best of the wool is produced with a view to wool-growth, and that of fine quality.

A matter which should not slip the attention of farmers is the quantity returned in feed during the winter in most of the States. In the spring, the returns for summering come early in the autumn in the shape of lambs, thus making a semi annual return.

GLEANINGS.

No better bedding for the stable can be found than forest leaves, and in many localities there is none other easier to get.

If the plow be put-down an inch or two deeper than ever before in fall-plowing clay lands, the effect will surely be good.
