BRANTFORD' NEW FACTORY.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Nov. 25.—The City Council met last night, and took into consideration the granting of a \$5,000 bonus to Mr. Clayton Slater for the erection of a cotton mill here. After very favourable discussion by the members present, it was decided that the Finance Committee should meet Mr. Slater and the City Solicitor this morning, with a view of receiving from Mr. Slater written agreements, pledging himself to carry out certain undertakings if the bonus was granted, and secure from him a deposi's of \$200 to cover the costs of the by-law if submitted. The Finance Committee was also empowered to instruct the City Solicitor to draft a by-law, to be submitted at the Council. Mr. Slater has purchased four acres of land on the Holmeda's property for his factory, and the new juilding will be commenced immediately after the bonus by-law is passed.
