KILLED SUNDAY BY OCEAN LIMITED

A sad and shocking accident occurr ed Sunday afternoon on the C.N.R. near Barnaby Station at 4.20 o'clock The ufortunate man was Abraham Thompson, a Norwegian by birth but a resident of Barnaby River for 29 years. It is thought that the man sat down on the track and had fallen to s'eep, as when the engineer of the Montreal Bound Ocean Limited rounded a curve a short distance apparently asleep. He immediately blew the whistle and applied the brakes, but the distance was so short in the next instant the train struck and litera'ly ground the man

When the train was stopped and the body picked up, it was found that both legs, one arm, and the the head badly crushed, while bones were protruding through the flesh

The body was brought into Newcast'e and Coroner F.J. Desmond was summoned to view the remains. Engineer Morrison and Fireman their testimony, which showed that the whistle had been blown as usual for the crossing as the train was nearing Barnaby River; also that when they saw the man the whistle was again blown and that everything had been done to stop the train in time, but the distance
