Shortly before the flag of the Repub-lic of Panama was formerally hoisted over the prefecture at Colon, Colombia, on Friday forenoon last, the new civil on Friday forenoon last, the new civil and military governor, Porfiro Melan-dez, celivered an oration. He said: "Isthmians—In the year 1821 the population of the Isthmus of Panama severed the tie that bound it to the government of Spain and spontane-onely adhered to the then new Repub-lic of Colombia. 


