The battleships put to sea immediately, and it is believed they will proceed westward.

Washington, Nov. 5. - The Japanese Legation received several days ago a cablegram from Tokio giving official re ports of recent operations around Port Arthur. Owing to the pressure of work the cablegram has just been translated. Practically the entire despatch confirms the report that the old part of Port Arthur was set on fire Oct 8th and that 36 on the following day great damage was 40 infflicted against the Rossian mine 39 clearing vessels in the harbor, two of

61 them catching fire.

Cuicago, Fov 7.—(Special)—A special

three days of continuous bombardment
of Port Arthur which caused extensive destruction to the Shojusan and Nery-usann forts in the west centre of the Russian line of defence and also to Keekwan fort, the right wing of the Japanese army assaulted Shejusan sailants entrenched themselves under

the glacis of the forts.

In the evening the left wing delivered 65 an assault on Keekwanf fighting its way to the lower parapet. There the Japs held the ground stubbornly in the face For part of Russian counter attacks. Having been reinforced during the night the Russsians charged down upon the Japs and a desperate band to hand confi c: ensued. The Japs beat back the enemy and destroyed two covered positions in the front moat. A Japanese sub lieutentant with 30 volunteers then succeeded in making his way to the rear of the fort. There he engaged in a personal conflict with a Russian officer and killed him. Having discovered two more defences in the rear moat the sublicutement withdrew his force with the

loss of two men. Later in the evening the advanced position of the Japs was taken and retaken twice. The besiegers succeeded in holding the approaches and constructing trenches connecting them with their own army front parallel. At dawn numbers of dead we e visible on the slopes north of Fort Five where defence were captured by the severe fighting of the night. These operations have driven an effective wedge into the Russian centre. Severe explosion have occurred in the fortress within the last few days. The total casualties of the Japanese in the late attack were 32 1,100. More than five hundred were killed up to Oct. 29.
