Provincial Elections Are On.

A meeting of the Liberal members of the Legislature and the Liberal candidates already in the field was held in Charlottetown last evening when it was concluded to bring on the Local elections, on Tuesday or Wednesday, the 6th or 7th of December.

In Quebec there appears to have been a gain of only four seats, the parties standing 52 Liberals to 11 Conservatives and 1 Independent.

New Brunswick did better for the Conservatives than at the election of 1900, returning 6 opposition members to 7 Liberals.

The Federal Elections.

The federal elections, held on Thursday last, resulted as our readers are already aware in favor of the Government.

In addition to our brilliant and talented leader, Mr. Borden, the Conservatives have to deplore the loss of several other men of first rank who fell in the fight.

The following are the largest majorities received in the contest: Toronto East, Kemp, Conservative had 2,121 majority.
