A HAPPY SPOT.

An Ambitious Rival to Goderich
as a Summer Resort.

A Southern Ontario Hook Place in its Claim
for Summer Visitors.

From a South Lambton Correspondent.

DEAR SIGNAL.—I have noticed with
interest that you, with your usual enter-
prise, have lately devoted large space to
the attractions of Goderich, as a summer
resort, and have called to our aid the
powers of poetry, as well as of prose.
Would it be possible to get inserted a
brief account of the attractions of this
place as a summer resort? That would
hardly be heeding the lion in his den.
There is no reference to the present oc-
cupant of the editorial chair. Besides
this is a peaceful business.

It happens, you see, that I have this
summer chosen another resort, and am
now convinced that my course was wise,
though you may think otherwise. And
now, seeing, that I am being so much
haunted by this change of air and scene,
would you be good enough to allow me
to make known a few facts to my suffer-
ing fellow countrymen. (This is no pa-
tent medicine advertisement, got up to
sell.)

Well, to begin, with your kind permis-
sion, this place is further south than
Goderich, and, Mr. Editor, you have
often heard of the sunny south. People
go south for their health. It may not be
generally known that the climate here is
warmer in summer than in winter.
Therefore, ye frozen citizens of Gode-
rich, come down, and be convinced, and
resort hither, and leave room for the for-
eigners who will believe The Signal.

We have excellent communication both
by land and water, especially by both
mixed together. We have all-rail routes
in all directions. We also have air-lines.
It is believed that we are unique in this
respect. I can recommend the top-rail
to hang on by, and the 4th to walk on.
The air-lines are chiefly patronized by
the upper classes, a large variety of whom
is here found. There is the whippoorwill,
the bobwhite, the peewee, the wren, the
robin, &c. The crows do not travel
much at this season. They spend time
reposing under the shadow of the scare-
crow.

This is a very healthy locality. There
is not a single doctor in it. It is no con-
tradiction to say that they could not live
in it. It is well known that people go to
summer resorts to escape the doctors.
Now this is impossible in Goderich, but
it is possible here.

This place is already popular as a sum-
mer resort. We have 4 or 5 Summers
in the house opposite. Then there are
Summers in every school house of the
district, in F— there are three Sum-
mers, two of whom are females. I was
once a summer myself. The very citi-
zen that comes down here will not see
breases. We have no sea breezes here,
but if there is a high north wind he will
smell the "Coal Oil" from Oil Springs and
Petrolia. I warn the intending visitor
that that is the only approach to refresh-
ment he has expected.

We offer great inducements in the way
of mineral springs. They are chiefly
iron. They are so plentiful that we have
four in our barn, and for the good of my
health I always carry ten around with
me under my heavy. Although we can-
not say that our farms are "diversified
by river, hill and dale," (see the cir-
cular), we have plenty to see. The sheep
and cows are perfectly quiet, if you do
not tread on the tails. This can be
easily avoided. To those desirous of
horseback exercise our stables offer a
fine selection. No Hobson's choice.
Horses guaranteed to stick to the rider.
To others of less courageous tempera-
ment, who prefer terra firma, long
stretches of green invite to exercise. But
pedestrians are warned not to sit care-
lessly down on little hills by the road-
side. They must otherwise obey the
proverb, "Go to the ant," &c. There
are positively no gravel sidewalks. This
will be a welcome announcement to the
citizens of Goderich.

For music we have engaged the Cana-
dian band to play every night during the
season in the park and on the lake; 500
performers, musical conductor, Captain
Frogmore. Those desirous of taking a
spin in one of our shells will be furnish-
ed with the wool free, fresh off the
sheep's back. Lovers of Isaac Walton
can here indulge their desires. Bait free.
Also fish furnished privately to unlucky
anglers.

"Mashers" will here find a brisk and
exciting trade. We have some here who
have been a hundred years in the busi-
ness. Their head is of wood. They
prepare the potatoes.

Our grounds are generally lighted up
with the best electric light yet discov-
ered. The wire is stretched 3 miles above
the earth. In the absence of water power,
which sometimes fails us, we have light-
ning bugs. These as a park illumination
are far superior to Chinese lanterns.
There is no trouble tying them to the
trees, and there is no danger of fire. We
have magnificent trees in our parks,
among them great oaks. This is no hoax.
We have also trees yielding seed, e. g.
frogs, tree frogs, I mean. Our orchards
will bear heavily. Limbs can be found
to bear the weight of 120 and 160 lbs.
When the fruit is ripe the visitor is in
clover.

We have preaching in two languages,
one of which is English. No dictionaries
needed. The churches are well filled.
No sleeping allowed. This is to prevent
snoring. Wakeful and thirty mosquitoes,
hired for the purpose, parade the pews.
The pulpit of our church is well filled.
This is credible, because our pastor looks
like the picture on the first page of the
geography, and is fond of dialing on his
subject. The choir was never known to
be in singing. The only notes used
are in singing. If you object to the col-
lection you will be made welcome all the
same—to leave, and attend the Free
Methodist meetings.

Let me close by inviting all and sundry
to come to D—, that they may
hear the neighing of the cows, and the
bleating of the horses. This, I can assure
them, will be a treat after the yelping of
the piano.
