All Glitter, Not Gold.

It would seem that the hard heart of the Board of Works is not to be moved by any hardship that the farmers and fishermen of the outlying settlements of St. John's are suffering from the state of the country roads. We have endeavored to do our best to put their case properly to the Board and to the Government, and our plea has been endorsed as reasonable and supported by the chief Government organ. Yet, so far as we have seen or heard, nothing is being done by the Board or the Government to assist these men and to put the roads in a condition under which they may carry on their business without embarrassment and delay. In season and out of season we have the Premier advertised broadcast as a man of uncommon working power, full of energy, and ever busy. So obviously and so often has this been done that the attempts are now becoming stale and ridiculous. If these virtues were present they would have been shown in getting the roads clear for farmers and fishermen, instead of displaying the show of virtues, and getting off such a job as the appointment of Mr. T. McGrath as clerk of the Registrar of Shipping. What energy exists is mainly wrongly directed, especially in the spending of money where it should not be spent, and the withholding of money where it is really needed.

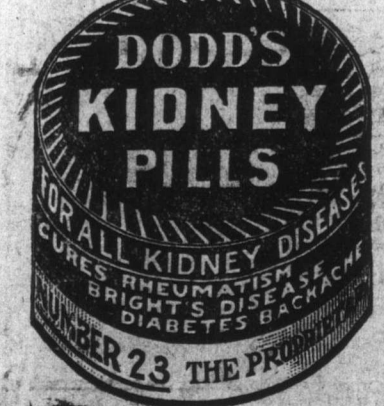
Released.

Repairs to Euphrates.

Mr. Chas. Pitman, shipwright, has made a good job on the S. S. Euphrates, at Angelo's premises. They were unable to get her on the south side dock as it was not in order last week, and there was no room on the R. N. Co. dock. It was then proposed to dock her in the primitive by watching the tides. She was run in at the cove near Angelo's wharf at high tide and when the tide went out her stern was so much out of water that Mr. Pitman and his men were able to put in a new shaft and the old propeller in two changes of the time. The steamer will be ready for the Bell Island service.

The Atlanta Surveyed.

Capt. Jos. Young and Mr. Hy. Howlett, surveyed the damaged schr. Atlanta to-day at Newman's wharf in the interest of the Twillingate Mutual Insurance Club, in which the hull is insured for \$3000. Diver Taylor will go under the ship's bottom this afternoon to ascertain the extent of the damage done there and also to stop the leaks there. None of the goods are insured. Besides Capt. Jones there are 6 men of a crew on board.

Another Unjust Appointment.

To-day the populace were apprised of the fact that T. R. McGrath, brother of P. T. McGrath, Editor of the Chronicle and Morris man of all work, had been appointed to the position of clerk to the Registrar of Shipping, made vacant by the death of the late Mr. C. Alcock. We learn that in connection with this appointment the salary which was formerly \$300 per annum has been raised to \$1,000 to suit the present appointee and his brother. When the matter became known to-day there was general indignation about the city. Why should it have been given to Tom McGrath? What special right has he to it? What particular fitness has he for it, and why should men—long servitors in the Custom House—like Mr. A. Levesurier and others be overlooked to suit Mr. McGrath as the questions being put to-day on all sides. Knowing that the appointment would be hailed with indignation the Premier had not moral courage enough to face the music and left on his picnic trip to England by the Florizel Saturday.

Saved the Children.

A fire occurred at No. 12 Bell Street to-day at Mr. John Lakin's. The clothes were hung too close to the stove, which was getting overheated, and there was no one present but two children in a cradle, the mother having gone out for a minute. Mrs. Northfield, on the next floor, noticed the burning, and Miss Northfield ran down just in time to save the children and put out the fire by throwing water on it. The children's clothes and the woodwork were burned.

OTTAWA, To-Day.
There was a Cabinet session till midnight on Saturday. This proceeding coupled with the report from Winnipeg that Earl Grey had been summoned to Ottawa, led to rumours respecting the political situation. It is reported that a dissolution has been decided upon. It is also rumoured that Earl Grey has been asked to act as mediator between the two parties in order to bring about an arrangement to enable Premier Laurier to attend the Imperial Conference. Mr. Borden stated that the attitude of the Opposition had not changed and the passage of the Reciprocity Resolutions would be resisted to the uttermost.

The Uprising in Canton

HONG KONG, To-Day.
Refugees confirm the earlier reports of an uprising in Canton. It appears to have been instigated by Anti-Manchus spreading revolution-ary propaganda among the troops at the time when they were nursing grievances. Hundreds of rebels were killed or wounded in the fighting. General Chung was mortally wounded while attempting to suppress a revolt, and died.

In the Police Court.

Justice Knight had a busy session to-day.
Two disorderlies and a drunk were discharged.
Johim Curea a seaman of Portugal, was charged with the larceny of \$10.17, the property of Hy. Tucker, caretaker of the General Hospital. Carca it appears had just served a term of 6 months for a robbery committed at Burgo. He was at the grounds of the hospital at work while a convict, the police say, and had the situation sized up so that Saturday he went to the hospital, broke a pane of glass in the lavatory and putting his hand through the aperture thus made drew the "catch" of the door and opening it entered. He took the money, it is alleged from one pocket of Mr. Tucker's vest, left hanging in the place. Through Mr. Evans, the interpreter, he pleaded not guilty and was remanded for 8 days so that further evidence may be procured in the matter.
Two young women of the dissolute type, were summoned by Sgt. Noseworthy for loose and disorderly conduct on the 27th, and were each fined \$5 or 14 days.
A similar fine was imposed on two men summoned by Const. Furlong for loose and disorderly conduct.
Const. Frampton summoned two residents of the Cove Road for fighting on the streets. They were also each fined \$5 or 14 days.
A woman summoned by Const. Martin for obstructing him while making an arrest Friday night, was fined \$1 or 3 days.
The man who was taken into custody when this occurred and who was drunk and disorderly and who resisted arrest and assaulted officers Martin and Paraday, was fined \$50 or 2 months.

A message received from Lark Hill to-day says that Capt. Geo. Joyce of Burin, arrived there yesterday from the western grounds. He reports a codfish plentiful and he took 130 qtls on his first baiting.
