

More Particulars About the Atlanta

Skipper Jones and James Coombs of the crew of the Atlanta were both the schooner struck the ice, being north of the end of Baccalieu at one o'clock in the morning of Saturday last. The berg was long and low and they did not see it till they were close up on it. They then ran aft to get effect arangements to have the man as far away from the crash as they removed to a place to observe prop-could. They were thrown down near the main hatch but were not seriously urt. The man at the wheel, Joseph Snow, was thrown right over it and pitched forward amongst pork barrels near the 'companion": his face bruised that he is laying up in the bunk ever since. Messrs. Colbourne and Lindfield, pasengers on the schr. vere in their berths and got an awfu shock. When the ship struck the bowsprit was carried away close the stem and the latter was battered down to the waterline. The Atlanta was thrown round broadside to the berg and her rail about midships was smashed. Her quarter then came into contact with it and the boat in the davitts there was stove and rendered useless for any life saving. The cargo in the after hold, puncheons and barrels of molasses and flour tc., was thrown against the post under the batch and throwing it forward broke off one of the iron pumps. Luck ily the other pump close by it was not injured otherwise the would go to bottom in about an hour because their only boat was rendered useless. The one pump, however, did the work of keeping her afloat after the deck cargo of kero oil and pork was thrown overboard. The crew when they recovered from the shock got out oars and rowed the Atlanta clear of the berg and then dropping the mainsail and foresail anchored in 100 fathoms of water. They had to tie a piece of cable to the chain in order to get bottom. The man putting out the light on Baccalleu saw then and went off to the Atlanta.
