**Cable News.**

DARMSTADT, May 2. Lieut. von Mirbach was killed, and Lieut. von Brunn died a few hours after an aviation accident near here, this evening.

LONDON, May 2. This morning's bulletin says: The Duchess of Cornwall had a fair night; her strength is maintained, but the condition of the patient still causes anxiety.

LONDON, May 2. An agricultural laborer at St. Oysth, near Clacton-on-Sea, earning \$4 a week, has been left \$100,000 by an old schoolfellow in the United States.

LONDON, May 2. At a dinner given to the King and Queen this week by Earl and Countess Granard, Queen Mary gave evidence of having changed her ideas about social customs. She appeared in a fashionable costume, and when cigarettes passed around said she had no wish to prevent others from enjoying what she herself did not care for.

BERLIN, May 2. Political circles here are very reticent to-day, apparently awaiting the result of the Council of Ministers at Vienna. On the stock exchange, however, activity indicated that the crisis had been passed. Speculators seemed to have reached the conclusion that the Powers would stick together and that Montenegro was preparing to be let down.

LONDON, May 2. Sidney Drew, who printed yesterday's issue of the suffragette organ, was arrested, and with the five women and Clayton the chemist, appeared at the Bow Street police station this morning. The court was crowded. Mrs. Pankhurst has gone to a nursing home, under supervision of the police. Several Scotland Yard detectives followed the motor ambulance, to prevent her escape.

ROME, May 2. The Pope is most impatient to resume work, and has decided to begin a reception of Cardinals to-morrow, commencing with Cardinal De Lai Secretary of the Consistorial congregation, and Cardinal Pompili. The Pontiff wishes to discuss with Car-

dinal De Lai several questions concerning America, whilst he has not seen Cardinal Pompili since his appointment as Vicar General of Rome.

NEW YORK, May 2. Suffragists hold a platform meeting to-night. Roosevelt and Dr. Anna Shaw are the speakers. To-morrow afternoon there will be a parade up Fifth Avenue. It is claimed 30,000 will march.

Another new serum is announced by Dr. Frederick Nicholson, a young German bacteriologist, who worked with Dr. Koch in the African Sleeping Sickness investigation, and thereafter continued his researches alone in Africa and other tropical countries. He reached South Africa in 1911, and claimed that while in the Belgian Congo, he had discovered a serum to cure consumption and leprosy. For the first part of 1912 his experiments were conducted at Camps Bay Laboratory, under the supervision of Dr. Jolly, Professor of Physiology in a South African College. He was advised to go to England to convince the British Medical Profession of the importance of his discovery. They agreed to investigate and provide patients for testing the serum. All these are for tuberculosis, but since their commencement, the serum is being tried in cases of malaria, leprosy, pernicious anaemia, myphilia, and other disorders of the blood. The report of such investigation, based on a month's experiments, must be beyond cavil, and it would be understating the case by merely saying that the treatment has been successful, as the results have been surprising. Patients whose deaths had been expected at any moment, are now on the high road to recovery. Others have been cured entirely; while others whose tuberculosis was of long standing and extreme virulence, have so recovered that neither sputum nor blood, on bacteriological examination, shows any sign of virulent bacilli.

**Weights and Measures!**

The following sections of the Act Respecting Weights and Measures are published for general information:

"Any person who shall use a beam, scale, weight, or measure, in the sale or exchange of any commodity, not assayed and stamped, or who shall alter the same after being so assayed and stamped, or who shall use steel-yards, except for the purpose of weighing hay or straw, or who shall use a beam made of wood, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars."

"Salt may be sold by measure, or by weight; if sold by measure, there shall be eighteen gallons to a tub (liquid measurement), and three tubs to a hoghead. Any person who shall sell or dispose of salt by measure otherwise than according to the standard hereby established, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty dollars."

"The Chief Inspector, and Inspectors shall, when required, inspect and adjust all beams, scales, weights and measures, brought to the office of either of them, according to the said standard, and they shall stamp or mark thereon the initials of the reigning Sovereign, and their own proper initials."

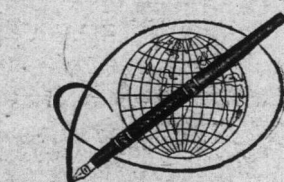

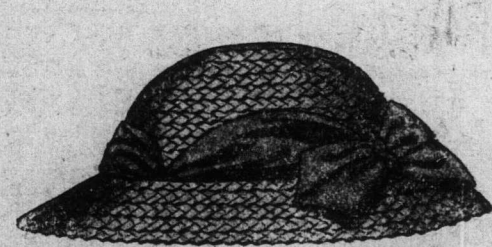
