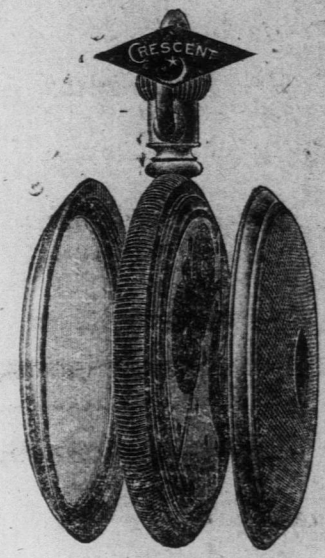

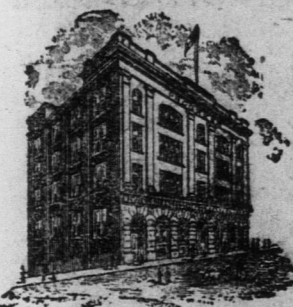

To the Editor of the Herald.
Dear Sir.—On Saturday last, the Herald alleged that several months ago a communication was sent by Mr. Cooker, President of the F. P. U., to the Hon. Sir Robert Bond, leader of the Liberal Party, having reference to a union of their forces. The Herald intimated that Mr. Cooker must have been aided in the composition of the letter in question, and I understood it to insinuate that I was the aider and abettor, or, at least, was suspected of being. If I misunderstood, I shall thank you to set me right.

I take the opportunity, however, to say that I did not compose or help to compose the alleged letter, or any letter to Sir Robert Bond; that I was not consulted about it; that I have never seen or heard of it; and that I have no connection of any kind whatever with any political party in this Colony. My connection with the F. P. U. is purely that of solicitor and client, and Mr. Cooker does not consult me about its politics.

I desire also to repeat a statement made by me several months ago, that I am not in politics here; that I have not at present any intention of entering into the approaching struggle, and that my earnest desire is to be permitted to practice my profession without the distraction of partisanship. I think I may appeal to my reputation for frankness, and ask that my words be taken at their face value.

The Herald speaks of me as one "out of the game." That is true in two senses—I am not a member of any existing party, and I cannot be a candidate. I am in no other sense, however, for I can enter the game except as a candidate, when I like, and shall likely do so when I feel that duty calls and opportunity offers. In the meantime, may I not fairly ask that the Herald shall not needlessly drag me into the discussion of party matters.

A Timely Sermon.

Rev. D. O'Callaghan occupied the pulpit in the Cathedral at 10 o'clock Mass yesterday and prefaced his sermon by a reference to the time fixed for burials. This is at 2 p.m. and in future there would be no deviation from this rule. He also referred to persons coming habitually late for Mass on Sundays. If they did not so to a second Mass, he held it would be as well for them to remain away altogether. He then made a powerful arraignment of conditions in the city on that day. He referred to the besetting sin of drunkenness and denounced the Saturnalia of the day preceding the last general holiday and the day itself. Drunkenness, fighting and blasphemy predominated and it was disgusting to walk the streets. He dwelt on the depravity of the drunkard whose church was the barroom, and portrayed the misery and wretchedness of the drunkard's home, wife and family. He also referred to other vices prevalent and the places where nameless vice reigned. He emphasized the necessity of looking after their children and keeping them off the streets at night, and while he was glad to hear witness that most of the St. John's people led virtuous lives, there were yet too many who allowed themselves to be dragged into the vice and he exhorted all who wished to deserve the name of Catholic to frequent the Sacraments and to thereby live better and more Christian lives in the future.
