Violin Brought \$19,500 at Auction.
 A Stradivarius Presented by Lord Newlands Was Sold Twice - Price Makes a New Record.
 London, April 26.—Amid remarkable enthusiasm, the Stradivarius presented by Lord Newlands to the Red Cross sale realized the magnificent sum of \$19,500 at Christie's to-day. It was sold in the first place to Lord Wemyss for \$12,500. The generous purchaser offered it for second auction, and it then went for \$7,000 to Mr. Brandt, who had previously advanced the bidding to \$12,000, against the original buyer's sum of \$12,500, which constitutes a record for such a violin at public auction. Although the famous "Emperor" Strad now in the possession of Kubelik, has had a greater value set upon it, until to-day the sum of \$10,000, paid for the "Missie" violin, dated 1760, which for fifty years was in the collection of Count Cozio di Salabue, was regarded as the highest price paid for a Stradivarius.
 In a descriptive note concerning the violin sold to-day, Lord Newlands said the instrument was bought by his father, the late Lord Newlands, from Laurie, then the leading violin dealer in Scotland. The inscription reads: "Antonius Stradivarius Cremonensis Faciit, 1702," followed by the monogram "A. S." with a cross over it. The violin is mentioned in Hill's book, "Antonius Stradivarius: His Life and Work," and belongs to what is called the Golden Period of Violins, which began about 1700.

MEXICO GENERAL LEAVES TO FIGHT FOR THE BRITISH EMPIRE.
 San Antonio, Texas, April 27.—Responding to a message from his mother in England, announcing the killing of his two brothers in the British army in the battle of Hill No. 60, and begging him to come home and fight for England, Major Eduardo de Bequer to-day wired his resignation to General Villa, of Mexico, in whose army he has fought for two years.
 Bequer, whose mother is English, was recently made active head of the aviation corps in Villa's army, and was sent to San Antonio on a special mission. He wired to New York to ship his aeroplane to Canada from where he will sail to join the British colors.

To-Day's Fire.
BUILDING GUTTED.
 Shortly after ten o'clock this forenoon a boy named Albert Martin noticed smoke issuing from several portions of the Goff Building on the Western side of Prescott Street, and forthwith ran to box 22 and sent in an alarm. The Central and Eastern Company responded and on arrival found the interior of the building to be a mass of flame and smoke. The lower part of the building was occupied by Messrs. Parkins and Lawrence, chemical manufacturers, while the top section was filled with furniture belonging to the E. S. Picture and Portrait Company. The fire is supposed to have originated from the ground flat, eating its way up through the ceilings and catching the furniture, which was dry as tinder and easily ignited. The firemen quickly had three streams of water playing on the building, though their efforts were hampered by the smoke which was seldom seen as thick before, and inside of half an hour had the fire under control. It was well there was no wind blowing as Oke's factory and several other buildings were in close proximity. At 11.10 o'clock an hour from the start, the all-out signal was rung in. Practically all the furniture, valued at about \$5,000, and upon which only \$2,500 insurance was carried, was completely destroyed. Messrs. Lawrence's stock also suffered much loss while the building itself was badly gutted.
