If this is correct. Mr. Hoover may well argue that the Government can abandon all consideration of minimum price legislation. The point which thus emerges is at the heart of the present food problem. Indeed, it is folly to talk of minimum prices for wheat at a time when wheat stores are being held for the outlandish prices forecast by the imaginations of the growers of wheat. Government officers who are not greatly concerned with the immediate political effects of their public acts should have no difficulty in realizing this fact. The same men should be accessible to an appreciation of value for | | | the probability that a maximum price on food articles may soon become an actual need. Public opinion will quickly return an indictment for antipatriotism against grasping food horders, and Mr. Hoover's diagnosis of the situation needs only to be verified and disseminated in torder to do' away for the time with the talk of protecting the farmers against low prices. Patriotism demands that there should be the utmost of restraint and carefulness exercised by every section of our citizenship which has to do with the food supply. Not only should the farmer decide quickly to sell his product at the fair prices prevailing and thus to place them at the disposal of the nation in the war, but the well-to-do citizens should be equally responsive to the public needs. There should be no extraordinary accumulation of food stocks and fuel in the cellars of our Commonwealth. This admonition is based not so much upon thoughts of economy in the household as upon the well recogniz-

IN FEEDING THE PEOPLE. The United States Secretary of Agriculture has just published an estimate of the food waste in the kitchens of the United States. Translated into terms of money, the department puts it at \$700,000,000 annually, or about \$7 per person. Conversely, a saving of \$7 per head in food would mean a saving of seven hundred million dollars worth a year. A saving of \$7 a year means less than 2 cents a day. In other words, if each person in the United States ate 2 cents worth less of food a day, or wasted 2 cents less, the annual gain to the country would be seven hun-dred million dollars. Such is the power of little things if a lot of people do them. Another striking illustration of this was offered by a recent British official computation that if each person in the British Isles used one lump less of sugar per day, the saving a year would be £150,000

sterling, or about \$750,000. In Canada we can accomplish vast results in the way of saving food and cheapening food if in every family a very small amount of care or self-denial is exercised. We all clamor at governments to "do something"; but it is safe to say that we could settle the trouble in a week if every family in Canada would suddenly start exercising moderate restriction in its meals, and rigid care with what is

left over.—Ex. Everyday Etiquette.
