Milady's Boudoir

The purpose of the finger nail is to
protect the tips of the fingers against
pressure and to give them firm sup-
port. It is said that they actually add
to the facility of the fingers, making
more acute the delicate sense of touch.
Finger nails are made of the same
substances as those which go to form
the feathers of birds, the claws of ani-
mals and the fins of fish.

Healthy nails are not flat, but cur-
ved slightly, of light rose color, and of
smooth surface. Brittleness is a de-
fect which is usually due to a de-
pleted state of the health.

Absolute cleanliness is a hygienic
principle which should never be dis-
regarded, since the space between
nail and flesh forms a lodgment for
disease germs. Soiled nails are no
only evidence of contempt for your
friend's good opinion of you, but they
are often the source of infection and
sickness.

With a thorough manicure once a
week and three minutes attention
every morning the coral tips can be
kept in perfect order.

For the home manicure the follow-
ing instruments are necessary: A pair
of pointed scissors, a thin, sharp, flexi-
ble file, an orange wood stick, sand-
paper, beveling files, a polisher, a jar
of powdered pumice stone and a small
bottle of peroxide or hydrogen.

The first matter to be considered is
the filing, which must be accomplished
while the nails are hard. The hands
must not be plunged into the soapy
bath until after the filing. When using
the file see that the flesh at the side
of the nail is pressed down, so the in-
strument will achieve a straight,
smooth line, leaving no ragged, jag-
ged places on the edge.

A little scarf skin or thick cuticle
will cling to the outline of the nail,
but that is afterward removed with
the beveling file. The shaping de-
pends, of course, upon personal taste.

The President at His Post.

(From the New York World.)

The report went out from Wash-
ington two or three days ago, and
has since been repeated, that the
President might or would attend in
person the forthcoming peace con-
ference in Europe at the seat of the
representative of the United States. The
existence of this report gives to it the
character of a "feeler" of public
opinion in the matter. The opinion
of the World can be given in a few
words. The place of the President
of the United States during and in
relation to the peace conference is
in this country and at the seat of the
government of whose vast affairs he
is charged with the direct adminis-
tration. There is no express con-
stitutional requirement preventing
the President from leaving the coun-
try during his term of office. But
there is a tradition of this kind
which goes back to the beginning of
the Republic, and which through
all the time following has steadily
grown in force from the substantial
respect shown to it by every occu-
pant of the presidential chair down
to this movement. Nor is it a rule
or practice having no better basis
than a mere force of tradition. Its
validity has been repeatedly recog-
nized in respect to the personal
safety of the President, and particu-
larly in respect to his continuously
intimate official relations with all
the affairs of the Federal Govern-
ment under the constitution. Our
ordinary business with foreign na-
tions, through the development of
means of instantaneous communica-
tion, has more and more come un-
der the direct transaction of the
State Department in Washington
through Ministers abroad no longer
called to act upon their own unad-
vised discretion or untruncated judg-
ment. The President can perform
no service to the United States or to
the world in personal attendance at
the peace conference in Europe
which he cannot as well perform
from his official post in Washington.

he German A Failure

Another Proof that the
Determined to Uphold
and Democracy.

Never before in the history
of the world-wars had there been
such colossal mistakes and over-
sights made by the military
of Prussia previous to and dur-
ing the terrible conflict commencing
on 4th, 1914. So confident were
they of success that they made no
provision in case of defeat. They were
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
