#### Child Welfare.

REPORT OF PROGRESS.

This month our first "Baby Week" St. John's was held in the Star of the Sea Hall. Lady Allardyce very kindly opened the week. There had heen a Baby Week Committee appointed to organize and to work out the arrangements, and it was a very great success indeed. Everybody worked with a will, and everybody turned up on the appointed days or times. We had very nice weather during the whole week, it was certainly a little bit chilly on two occasions for the examination rooms, but this difficulty was overcome by the loan of good oil stoves, which soon made the undressing rooms

Doctors and examination rooms were arranged at one end of the Hall for the Health Conference Department, and we were fortunate in having two smaller rooms off the Hall for part of this purpose, and with screens and partitions the rest was easily fixed up. The tea room was also off the main hall, and it was here that Mrs. MacKeen and her Committee of ladies so capably provided teas for those mothers who had brought their babies to the Conference. Babies and children up to five years of age were examined, and everything ran as smoothly and expeditiously as possible, by the express management of Mrs. Angus Reid, and her Committee. In all 264 children were examined by city doctors who came in at stated times during the week, and so made our Health Conference possible. We owe them a hearty vote of thanks.

Dr. Janes, dentist, was most generous to us, for he came each morning from 10-12 to examine the teeth of any child up to five years. It is be greatly deplored that more others did not avail themselves of this great opportunity to get advice about the dentition of their chldren. Seventeen children under five years were examined, and it was found that out of that number only one

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child was free from dental caries. Out of the 264 children examined, 114 needed minor operations. The only hope at present of getting treatment for these children is through the McNab bed, and the generosity of city doctors who are giving their time to this great work. So far 34 operations have been done by these means during the last two months.

It will be seen that through the agency of Baby Week much work of clinical and medical value will result for the good of the community, and not only for the work that will be done as the outcome of it, but for the educating of public opinion on such matters affecting the well being of such children in our midst.

Beside the medical examination the hall was covered with health posters, many of them very beautiful ones, and there were also stall de-

The quarterly report of the C.W.A. was also read on the 25th of this month at the quarterly meeting in the Colony Club and the review shows now much actual nursing treatment has also been done by the Welfare nurses, apart from the ordinary routine work of visiting newborns and attending clinics. 
