REPORT OF PROGRESS.

This month our first "Baby Week" in St. John's was held in the Star of the Sea Hall. Lady Allard very kindly opened the week. There had been a Baby Week Committee appointed to organize and to work out the arrangements, and it was a very great success indeed. Everybody worked with a will, and everybody turned up on the appointed days or times. We had very nice weather during the whole week, it was certainly a little bit chilly on two occasions for the examination rooms, but this difficulty was overcome by the loan of good oil stoves, which soon made the undressing rooms warm.

Doctors and examination rooms were arranged at one end of the Hall for the Health Conference Department, and we were fortunate in having two smaller rooms off the Hall for part of this purpose, and with screens and partitions the rest was easily fixed up. The tea room was at the main hall, and it was here that Mrs. MacKen and her Committee of ladies so capably provided teas for those mothers who had brought their babies to the Conference. Babies and children up to five years of age were examined, and everything ran so smoothly and expeditiously as possible, by the express management of Mrs. Angus Reid, and her Committee. In all 264 children were examined by city doctors who came in at stated times during the week, and so made our Health Conference possible. We owe to them a hearty vote of thanks.

Dr. James, dentist, was most generous to us, for he came each morning from 10-12 to examine the teeth of any child up to five years. It is to be greatly deplored that more mothers did not avail themselves of this great opportunity to get advice about the dentition of their children. Seventeen children under five years were examined, and it was found that out of that number only one child was free from dental caries.

Out of the 264 children examined, 114 needed minor operations. The only hope at present of getting treatment for these children is through the McNab bed, and the generosity of city doctors who are giving their time to this great work. So far 34 operations have been done by these means during the last two months. It will be seen that through the agency of Baby Week much work of clinical and medical value will result for the good of the community, and not only for the work that will be done as the outcome of it, but for the educating of public opinion on such matters affecting the well being of such children in our midst.

Beside the medical examination the hall was covered with health posters, many of them very beautiful ones, and there were also stall demonstrations.

- (1) Nutrition and haybox cookery
- (2) Clothing for children with patterns of each garment.
- (3) Maternity Dept. in charge of Mrs. Hiscock with much literature on these subjects for distribution. The Girl Guides also did a demonstration on how to bath a baby; they had lectures previously in the clinic, and last week did an excellent paper on child care.

QUARTERLY REPORT.

The quarterly report of the C.W.A. was also read on the 25th of this month at the quarterly meeting in the Colony Club and the review shows how much actual nursing treatment has also been done by the Welfare nurses, apart from the ordinary routine work of visiting newborns and attending clinics.

Sanctuary for Big Bison Herd

After it had been definitely concluded for years that the American Bison in its wild state was extinct on the continent and that the only members of this mighty race in Canada were included in the 6,000 animals in Wainwright Park, a Dominion government survey party discovered last year about 1500 buffalo ranging in the uncharted areas of Northern Alberta, between the Peace and Slave Rivers and the Great Slave Lake. Steps were immediately taken by the Dominion government to preserve these animals, the results of which are now announced in the establishment of a new wood sanctuary.

The entire habitat of the wild bison has been included in the new sanctuary and in addition a part of the habitat of the woodland caribou which ranges the Caribou Mountains. The total area of the new park is approximately 10,500 miles square and within this the wild bison have two distinct ranges, within each of which are the seasonal habitats frequented by each herd.

The northern range is bounded on the south, east and northeast by the Little Buffalo river, on the north by the Myrting river, and extends west almost within 15 miles of Buffalo lake. The southern range is bounded on the east by the Slave river, on the west and northwest by the Jack Fish and Little Buffalo rivers, and on the north by Salt river.

Arrangements for systematic patrols have been made and cabins constructed for wardens at points which will facilitate an efficient patrol service all the year round.

This new addition to known Canadian wild life gives the Dominion the largest two buffalo herds in the world, the other being that in captivity in Wainwright National Park in Alberta.

The preservation of these animals in their wild state, besides being of interest and value from the standpoint of natural history, is a move of moment to all people on the continent. Few in this generation have had the opportunity of viewing the monarch of the plains roaming unhampered on his natural range.

Though at present the visits of tourists are not encouraged on account of the inaccessibility of the location to ordinary convenience and the lack of facilities, there is no doubt that these will be remedied as soon as practicable.
