#### Weekly Meeting

##### MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

After confirmation of Minutes of last meeting, communications were tabled from the Deputy Colonial Secretary, as follows:

(1) That the Government had acceded to the Council's request for guarantee for a loan from the Royal Bank of Canada, and that same now only awaited the signature of His Excellency the Governor in Council.

(2) That the Council's application for increased road grants would be brought to the notice of the Executive Government at an early date.

Following the enquiry recently forwarded the Truckmen's Protective Union re alleged difference in rate of pay for truckmen employed on City Works and those employed by the W. I. Bishop Company, which was said to be 44 cents per hour against 55 cents paid by the latter, the Secretary of the Union stated that the Council's request for the same privileges as the Company referred to had been defeated by a vote taken. He made special mention of the fact that the men employed by the W. I. Bishop Company are not required to load their carts. Further information with regard to prevailing rates is to be obtained, and the matter is in the meantime deferred.

Mr. J. J. Mulcahy wrote re the condition of the pavement fronting his premises, Water Street, and called attention to the fact that a portion of same was City property and that he would like to know the intentions of the Council in the matter. The Council will repair that portion of the sidewalk for which it is responsible, while Mr. Mulcahy will be required to attend to that fronting his premises.

Messrs. Blackwood, Emerson and Winter, Doctors Roberts, Burden, and other residents of Duckworth Street requested that the present cobble stone drains be replaced by curb and gutter, in view of concrete sidewalks having been laid in front of their respective residences. This was agreed to, provided they undertake to pay proportion of cost.

Messrs. Pope Brothers asked that repairs be made to the Mundy Pond Road. This was referred to the City Engineer for report.

They also complained of insanitary conditions existing in this section, owing to a number of houses being without water and sewerage facilities, although erected on the street where such connections are available. It was decided that the Sanitary and Plumbing Inspectors visit the place and see that the property owners make necessary installations, failing which legal proceedings will be taken to enforce the regulations.

Mr. A. Pynn, Gear Street, applied for water and sewerage installation. As the site on which Mr. Pynn's dwelling is erected is private property the Council cannot accede to his request until such time as the owner of the land is prepared to give necessary bonds for extension of the mains.

Re Gill's Cove obstruction, the City Solicitor reported that according to instructions action had been taken in the Central District Court, and the Defendants had undertaken not to obstruct the Cove. This undertaking has been made a record of the Court.

In the matter of Mr. Walter Mill's application for extension of water and sewerage, Golf Avenue, if he is prepared to pay his proportion of cost the Council will give same consideration.

Mr. W. H. Macpherson wrote re conditions at Bowring Park, particularly at the Bathing Houses, from which during the past week some wearing apparel, belonging to ladies who are visiting the City, was taken. The Superintendent is investigating this, and it is likely that the culprits will be located within a few days.

Messrs. Blackwood, Emerson and Winter, on behalf of Mr. Alan Long, complained of the annoyance caused him as well as other residents of the Battery owing to offensive matter being strewn around the place. The Sanitary Supervisor reported that acting upon instructions he had visited the road in question and found no cause of complaint whatever.

A communication was read from the Solway Process Company re the treatment of roads with Calcium Chloride for laying of the dust. Arising out of same considerable discussion took place, and reference was made to the many letters appearing of late in the

daily press on the subject of sprinkling streets.

The treatment of our roads with Calcium Chloride is nothing new to the Council or its officials, it having been tried out some twenty years ago when a large number of caiks were imported. The treatment of roads with salt water was also given a trial. Neither method was satisfactory and the results obtained were no better than by the present system of sprinkling with clear water.

The dredging of salt water from the Coves would, as all must realize, be out of the question in view of the detritus constantly emptying into same, while to take it from the Harbour would mean the importation of pumps and other expensive apparatus, which would in itself be beyond the finances of the city.

The Council is endeavouring at present to treat as many roads as possible with the limited means at its disposal, namely two motor sprinklers and several horse-drawn vehicles, and for the purpose a sum of about \$3,750.00 has been allocated.

The contract for painting and renovating the interior of the City Hall was awarded J. P. Hand.

#### Plans.

The following were passed on the recommendation of the City Engineer at whose office necessary Permits may be obtained:

H. Mitchell, annex, Duckworth St. J. Higgins, annex, Monkstown Rd. That of H. Butler, Scott Street, to erect a dwelling and garage, was deferred until such time as he submits proper location plan.

The application of A. E. Hickman & Company to instal tank at their West End garage was referred to the Engineer and Inspector General.

The Medical Officer of Health reported two new cases of typhoid and one of diphtheria in the city during the week.

This report must be considered by the public generally as very satisfactory when compared with reports for the same period in recent years, and it may be pointed out that the Sanitary Supervisor, with his staff, have during the past few weeks given particular attention to the cleaning and flushing of drains, hydrants, hoppers, catch-basins and gullies. As a result the health of the city is showing a general improvement.

The City Engineer reported on the work done by the Water Works, Roads and Sewerage Departments for the week.

Within the last few days a quantity of 6 inch pipe was imported and arrangements are now being made whereby water and sewerage extensions on Cornwall and Hamilton Avenues, Topsail Road, etc., will be commenced next week.

With regard to the request of the Playground Association to use a portion of Bannerman Road for holding of a circus entertainment, the proceeds of which will be proportionately divided between the proprietors and the Association, the Council visited the desired site on Friday morning last and having given the matter consideration decided to grant permission on the following conditions:

(1) A portion of the road will be allowed them, subject to the approval of the City Engineer;

(2) 20 feet must be reserved for traffic, and in addition the sidewalks on either side must be left open for pedestrians;

(3) Any excavations or disturbances to the road must be replaced and put in good condition; and

(4) The Association must guarantee sufficient police control of traffic.

Mr. C. J. Cahill, on behalf of the Association, wrote stating the conditions laid down by the Council were considered satisfactory.

The Secretary of the Newfoundland Board of Fire Underwriters wrote re the appointment of an Inspector of Electrical Wiring, forwarding copies of letters received from the Nova Scotia Board of Fire Underwriters and By-Laws of the city of Halifax respecting electrical installations. Consideration was deferred for the present.

Many minor matters were discussed and disposed of, and after passing of weekly accounts the meeting adjourned.

#### Conserving Air- plane Power

Paul Painleve, Prime Minister of France, recently was the sponsor of a new appliance, the invention of Louis d'Amblanc, that is said to enable airplane engines to maintain their power at great heights. Airplanes lose half their power when they rise above 15,000 feet. With the d'Amblanc appliance, it is claimed, an airplane loses very little power. Weighing only 16 pounds, the appliance is fitted to the interior of the engine. Trials made by the French Air Service are said to have proved the appliance's value.
