in the Arctic is entirely feasible. Another important experiment was made with radio, the Peary and the Bowdoin proving beyond a question of doubt that wireless transmission in daylight and through the auroral band is possible.

Innumerable Specimens.

In returning, the Peary had on board two young blue foxes, which Commander MacDonald intended to take to the zoo at Syracuse, New York. The foxes stayed on board until the steamer reached Curling, Newfoundland, and then deserted. A reward was offered by the Commander and one of the foxes was recaptured six miles from Curling by a Sergeant of Police. The other is still roaming in the woods at Curling.

It is less than four months since the Peary and the Bowdoin sailed north from Sydney. Fine weather was experienced all through until last week, when the storm which wrecked the rum runner Inez G., off this harbour, also caught the exploration vessels. The Peary had a hard time weathering the storm, the water at times going over her upper rail and deluging the decks. As luck would have it, Commander MacDonald had ordered everything stowed below decks, and the Peary was all prepared when the storm struck. Nothing was damaged except the wings of the
