The day was everything that could be desired, and the landlord, Mr. Robert Dryden, provided an excellent dinner. Lieut. Col. Higinbotham paid the scene a visit during the afternoon.

The Fergus Drill Shed.

We are glad to notice that the work on the Fergus Drill Shed is being pushed on with great vigour. The structure is large, substantial and well built. It is 50 feet in width by 100 feet in length. In the end fronting the street there is a large arched doorway, and the building is lighted by several large and handsome windows on each side. We should think there will be no difficulty in accommodating 1,000 people within its walls. Mr. Andrew Forrester is contractor for the mason work, and Mr. Wm. Beattie for the carpenter work. Mr. Forrester completed the mason work on Friday last, and Mr. John Gerrie, of the St. Andrew's Hotel, with that liberality for which he is so well known, took advantage of the occasion to invite the contractors with their men to an oyster supper, which came off at his hotel the same evening. The members of the Council were also present by invitation. The Reeve, George McInnes Esq., occupied the chair, Mr. Forrester acted as vice chairman. After the company had done ample justice to the bivalves and other dainties which loaded the tables, the chairman after giving the usual loyal and patriotic toasts, proposed the health of the Mr. Forrester in very complimentary terms, and referred to the energy he had shown in pushing on the work, the result being that the mason work was finished within a month from the day the foundation stone was laid. Mr. Forrester made an appropriate reply, and gave his employees credit for the way in which they had worked. Other toasts followed such as "The Reeve and Council of Fergus," responded to by the Reeve, Mr. H. Michie and Mr. Jas. Phelan; "the mechanics employed at the Drill Shed," responded to by Mr. Munroe in a short and excellent speech; "The Press," responded to by Mr. Craig and Mr. Innes. Some excellent songs were sung during the evening, and altogether the reunion was a most pleasant and agreeable one. A rousing bumper was drunk to the health of the host and hostess and well they deserved it, for the entertainment was solely the result of the promptings of Mr. Gerrie's generous feelings, and as such was all the more appreciated by the workmen.

The October Fair.

The number of cattle brought to the fair on Wednesday was moderately large, but the drovers characterised them as "rough." In fact first class beef was not at the Guelph October fair any more than it was at the three which preceded it. There were a few cattle moderately fat, and these brought fair prices, but so far as we could discover (and we were at some trouble searching) there was not a single animal judged worthy to be sold by weight. Milch cows (such as they were) were numerous, and sold rather low—a natural consequence of the quality. Young cattle were plentiful, and so were working oxen, but very few of the latter were as good as we generally see brought to market. Mr. Dickieson, of Ramona, had the best yoke on the ground; and he held them at \$120. Others were offered at from \$80 to \$100, and some went below the lowest of these figures. In short, business was dull and buyers were indifferent. Owners seemed anxious to sell, but farmers do not appear to have yet learned that they must accommodate their demand to the requirements of the market. There were more horses than we have seen at a fair for some time. The following are a few of the sales: Jas Blanchard, Ramona, sold a yoke of oxen for \$97.50, John Grey, Erin, a cow \$30, John Aitcheson, Erin, 3 head for \$55, Mr. Chadwick, ar. a cow \$43, Denis McWilliams a steer \$47, Ed. Skeritt, Ramona, 2 steers and a heifer \$75.50, Geo. Copeland 2 steers and a heifer \$80, Jas Pearce, Nassagawanna, a cow \$20, Wm. Hood 2 milch cows \$30 each, and 2 fat cows for \$70, Peter McTavish a yoke of steers \$50, Geo. Ferguson a cow \$24, Mr. Spencer a steer \$48, and John Stewart a cow and calf \$25.

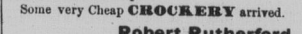
