The Lord Chancellor is always a member of the British Cabinet; and there are almost always several judges in the British Parliament."

We print to-day a letter from ar ential resident in the Township of Mulmur, in which he discusses the respective merits of the Hamilton & North-Western Railway from that city to Hog Bay, and the proposed line from Guelph to Orangeville and thence to Collingwood. Having an intimate acquaintance with the country and its resources through which both lines will run, our correspon dent's statements and conclusions are worthy the serious attention of all parties interested. He argues that the Hamilton & Hog Bay line will not prove remunerative, and that at will not command the traffic which its Hamilton advecates anticipate He points out that Hog Bay is not ar advantageous terminus, and that if it were shifted to Collingwood, this will make the route even more circuitous make the route even more circuitous. On the other hand he points out the advantages which the Guelph & Orangeville line would offer, not only to Hamilton, but to the fine track of country through which it would run, many parts of which at present are far from railway communication. This line too, he shows, could be built for half the money which the other one will cost. The Great Western already connects Hamilton and Guelph; from the lat-Great Western already connects
Hamilton and Guelph; from the latter the road could be run in almost a
straight line to Orangeville, and from
thence, as our correspondent points
out, it could easily be built to Singhampton. The remaining 15-miles,
from that place to Collingwood is the
only difficult part of the route.
The views of our correspondent
