In the course of his paper on the "study of the bacteriology of the posterior nasopharynx in scarlatina," Dr. Ferry stated that he found a germ which he believed to be the cause of the disease.

In the contagious diseases hospital years there was not a case of the dis ease among those so treated. The immunizing was then discontinued for a space of three months, when several nurses contracted scarlet fever. Dr. Ferry, before closing, offered his discovery to the members of the conerence for further tests.
