PARTLY CLOUDY AND A LITTLE COOLER.

Toronto, May 20, 11 p.m.—The depression over Southern Minnesota yesterday is now central over the Lower Ottawa Valley and is increasing in energy. It is causing showery weather throughout the lake region, Quebec and New Brunswick. High pressure is approaching the lake district from the Northwest. Another depression now covers Alberta and Assiniboia, causing decidedly warm weather there. Further west in Manitoba the temperatures are more moderate.

In the Dining-Room.

SATURDAY, MAY 22.

BREAKFAST.—Sliced pineapple. Hamburg steak. Asparagus omelette. Oatmeal gems. Coffee.

LUNCHEON.—Sweetbreads. Radishes. Bread and butter. Stewed Rhubarb. Lady fingers. Russian tea.

DINNER.—Fried veal cutlets, tomato sauce. Spinach with eggs. Potato snow. Delmonico pudding. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Asparagus Omelet.—Boil ten stalks of asparagus in slightly salted water for fifteen minutes. Drain and cut the edible part into small pieces. Beat five eggs until very light, add a small half-teaspoonful of salt; pour them into a hot frying-pan containing a teaspoonful of butter; spread the prepared asparagus on the upper side, and when perfectly hot fold the omelet together and serve.

Fried Veal Cutlets.—Put into a frying-pan two tablespoonfuls lard or beef drippings. When boiling hot lay in the cutlets (two pounds for five people) well seasoned with one-half teaspoonful salt and one-fourth teaspoon pepper and dredged with flour. Brown nicely on both sides, and then remove the meat and set aside the grease for further use. Serve cutlets with following sauce:

Tomato Sauce.—Take a quart can of tomatoes; place over the fire in a stewpan; put in one slice of onion, two cloves, a teaspoonful of salt and a saltspoonful of pepper. Boil twenty minutes. Remove from the fire and strain through a sieve. Melt in a clean saucepan a tablespoonful of butter, and add a little sprinkle in a tablespoonful of flour. Stir until it browns and froths a little. Mix the tomato pulp with it and it is ready for the table. Half of this quantity will be sufficient to serve with the cutlets. Set the remainder aside to be reheated and served with macaroni, which has been boiled until tender, for luncheon on the following day.

Spinach with Eggs.—Take half a peck of spinach and wash it three or four times. Drain it and put it in boiling water. Cook twenty minutes, being careful to remove the scum. When it is quite tender take it up and drain it well. Chop it fine and put it into a saucepan with a slice of butter and

size of an egg and a little salt and pepper, not more than a saltspoonful of each. Set it on the fire and let it stew five minutes, stirring it all the time. Turn into a vegetable dish, shape it into a mound, and slice two or three hard-boiled eggs over the top.

Potato Snow.—Choose seven mealy potatoes; pare them and cook them well; drain them and mash thoroughly. Press them through a fine sieve into the dish in which they are to be served. Strew a little fine salt upon them previous to sending them to the table.

Delmonico Pudding.—Boil together one quart of milk, two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch, five tablespoonfuls of sugar and two well-beaten eggs. Two minutes of actual boiling is sufficient time to cook it. When cool add one-half saltspoonful of salt and one cupful of shredded coconut. Pour into a pudding dish and bake until set and of a delicate brown color. Eat cold with cream.

—A profitable and enjoyable union meeting of the Presbyterian Women's Foreign Mission Societies of the city was held in the First Church last night. Mrs. McWhorter, the representative of the First Church at the annual convention at Hamilton, presided. Reports of the convention were given by Mrs. (Rev.) Johnston, Mrs. (Rev.) Tailing, Mrs. McWhorter, Mrs. (Rev.) Murray, and Miss Fraser. Mrs. Sharp led in prayer, and Mrs. Murray gave a Scriptural reading. The rain prevented a fuller attendance.

—Guelph Mercury: The annual excursion of the C. P. R. employees will take place on July 29, and the objective point will be the Royal City. This means that the city's population for that day will be augmented by about 4,000 people. The London baseball club also play here with the Leafs on that day, and, between the two events it should, and will no doubt, be a gala day for the citizens. The fare from London will be very low, and no doubt a great many from that city will visit Guelph then.

—A suit over a deal in horses between William Collins, of London, and J. D. Graham, of Sheppard street, Toronto, came up at Osgoode Hall yesterday, upon motion to continue an injunction granted to Mr. Collins in his suit to recover \$900, the price, he says, of the defendant agreed to pay him. The injunction, however, restrains Thomas Rolston, a porter for John Macdonald & Co., from disposing of the horses under a chattel mortgage made to him by J. D. Graham. The motion to continue the injunction was enlarged a week.

—At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the London Methodist district, the question of superannuation was dealt with, and those already on the list were continued, but none added. Several young men were examined and continued on probation, namely: Revs. H. J. Uren, Knowles, J. A. Jackson, J. J. Sinclair, E. G. Powell, J. W. Mortimore, Barker, of Dorchester, and Keillington, of Thorndale. Rev. R. A. Miller, of the Westminster circuit, having completed his probation, will be recommended to the conference to be received into full connection and ordained.

—A number of the chapters of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Canada have sent to the grand treasurer a contribution of \$157 (about 625 rupees) for transmission to India to the famine fund. This contribution has been sent in response to a circular from Mr. Walsh, of Ingersoll, grand 2 of the Grand Chapter of Canada, to the chapters, and follows the grant of \$1,000 made last January at the convocation of Grand Chapter to the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto. It is interesting to note that many of the "Parsees" of India are Masons, and Royal Arch Masons, with well appointed chapters in Bombay and other parts of India, and are said to be descendants of the ancient Persian nobility.

—The Yale (University) News of May 18, says: "The executive committee of the Y. M. C. A. took tea together in the Dwight Hall library last evening at the invitation of Mr. J. B. Rose, '97. A pleasant feature of the evening was the gift of \$100 to the general secretary (Mr. W. H. Salmons of London, Ont.), as a mark of esteem from a few of his associates. H. S. Coffin, '97, in making the presentation, paid a glowing tribute to the work which Mr. Salmons has done for this and other colleges during his three years' secretaryship. Mr. Salmons leaves Yale on May 27 for Australia, where he will spend two years in organizing and supervising the Christian work in the colleges."

—A successful concert and assembly under the auspices of Lodge Princess of Wales, Daughters of England, was given last night in the Foresters' Hall, East London. Dr. H. Williams was chairman of the concert, and almost the entire programme was furnished by the Holden jubilee singers. At the conclusion, Mrs. Hooper, president of Princess of Wales' Lodge, moved a vote of thanks to the chairman and jubilee singers, which was carried unanimously. The committee in charge was composed of the lodge's officers: Mrs. Hooper, president; Mrs. Wheatcroft, vice-president; Mrs. Penwarden, chaplain; Bro. Robt. Simmons, secretary; Mrs. Dyson, treasurer; Mrs. Allen, first guide; Miss Maud Leonard, second guide; Miss Johnston, third guide; Mrs. Nicholls, fourth guide; Mrs. Smith, inside guard; and Mrs. Edwards, outside guard. The lodge has only

been organized six years, and it already has 70 members.

NORTHWEST VETS WILL CELEBRATE.
A meeting of the veterans of 1855 (the Northwest rebellion) met at the City Hall last night and decided to hold a celebration at Springbank on July 25. Mr. W. Wanless presided. Circulars will be sent out inviting all volunteers to join in the celebration who took part in the expedition. The names and addresses will be gladly received by Mr. Robert Irvine, or any other member of the committee.

A "SUBJECT" TALKS.
Says the Ferris Hypnotist Show is a Pure Fake—The Burial Act Explained.

The Hamilton Times says: "Prof. Ferris' engagement has not been a paying one; he lost considerable money—or, rather, somebody lost it. Hotel-keeper Caldwell, of Simcoe, was in the box office all the time, ostensibly as manager of the show. 'This morning Ferris and Caldwell left the city and seven of the subjects. The subjects feel worse than the city does. Their claims for salaries aggregate several hundred dollars and some are penniless. They were put out of the Dominion Hotel today. The Dominion has a claim against Ferris for \$80.'

"One of the subjects told a Times reporter that the show was a pure fake. 'Why,' said he, 'I was not under hypnotic influence when I performed at the Grand. We all knew our parts.' Regarding the burial of the two men, he said the men were 'doped' before being buried, and that they were kept in a drugged condition. The man who woke up,' said the informant, 'was neglected, and had not been doped regularly. Ferris had a secret rubber tube, through which he blew powder into the coffin. The men were being killed slowly, and the Humane Society should have taken action. At night, when no person was around the sleepers were given condensed food, if they revived at all. 'Ferris brought the seven 'subjects' and a song and dance artist to this city with him. Their homes are a long way from Hamilton."

THE SUBLIMITY OF ASSURANCE.

Displayed by People Who Get Printing Outside and Ask Papers for Free Ads.

One of the many sharp thorns thrust abusively into the anatomy of the publisher is the request for free advertising from the man who gets his printing done at some small job office. The Alton, Pa., Chronicle gave voice to a vigorous protest against this very common abuse as follows:

Today a young man called at this office with a big pile of circulars on his arm and requested us to publish the contents of the circulars on the paper as a puff. The circular, which was a wretched specimen of the typographical art, had been printed in one of the numerous amateur job offices with which this city is cursed, and which generally consist of a rack of second-hand type and a dilapidated hand-press, presided over by a genius who knows about as much of job printing as a child knows about navigation. A person, however, has a perfect right to have his job printing done where he chooses, but for an individual to call at a newspaper office which has a job printing department, and calmly thrust a circular printed in another establishment under the nose of the editor and request him to publish the contents free of charge, is simply paralyzing. Yet this is something which happens nearly every day. No one thinks of going to a store, buy a big bill of goods, and then go to a rival establishment and request the proprietor to send his delivery team to the place where the goods had been purchased and deliver them free of charge. Yet the principle is the same. The worst offenders in this respect are the numerous circular societies. The majority of them have their job printing done in amateur offices, and when they come around and want about \$10 worth of free puffing. And a peculiar thing about it is, that these persons appear to be greatly amazed that the editor should complain of such treatment. If only some persons would get rid of the idea that a paper is an eleemosynary institution, but one conducted on business principles, it would save the managers an enormous strain in their gray matter.

Arrangements have almost been completed for a jubilee thanksgiving service, to be held in Notre Dame Church, Montreal, on Sunday evening, June 29, in commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the Queen's accession to the throne of Great Britain. It is to surpass anything of the kind ever before attempted in Canada. The music will be the great feature. There will be a choir of 600 voices, and an orchestra (in addition to the great organ) of 50 or 60 pieces. Lord and Lady Aberdeen will be present.
