TWO DAYS IN HISTORY.

October 8.

1354—Nicolo di Rienzi, the fa-
mous Roman tribune and
reformer, was murdered in
a popular tumult.1361—Famous "trial of battle"
at Notre Dame, Paris, be-
tween Chevalier Macaire
and the dog of M. Mont-
didier, whom he had mur-
dered; the dog was con-
quered, the man confessed
and was executed.1372—Elizabeth Cromwell (born Bourchier),
widow of the great Oliver, died at Nor-
borough.1736—John Hancock, statesman and "signer"
died at Quincy, Mass.; born 1737.1830—Vittorio Alfieri, count, great tragic poet,
died in Florence; born 1749.1821—Henry Christopher, talented but cruel
general and later king of Hayti, killed
himself; born 1797; crowned as Henry I
June 2, 1812.1831—Edmund Clarence Steadman, poet, was
born in Hartford.1837—Charles Fourier, famous socialist, died at
Paris.1890—Franklin Pierce, fourteenth president,
died at Concord, N. H.; born 1804.1912—Remarkably rapid fire destroyed Flisht-
go, Wis., and nearly all its people, some
say over 800 persons.

October 9.

1047—Pope Clement II died.

1048—Louis XII of France and
Princess Mary, sister of
Henry VIII of England,
were married at Abberville,
France; three months later
he died, and two months
after that she married the
Duke of Suffolk.1547—Miguel Cervantes de
Sotomayor, born at Alcalá
de Henares; he and Shak-
spere died on same day, 1616.1736—Barbara Villers, duchess of Cleveland,
mistress of Charles II, died.1757—Charles Comte d'Artois, afterward
Charles X, born at Versailles, died 1836.1832—Lewis Cass was born in Exeter, N. H.;
died 1893.1836—John Todd was born in Rutland, Vt.; died
1893.1843—William Smith O'Brien, Thomas Francis
Meagher and others were sentenced to
death for rebellion; O'Brien was finally
pardoned, the others after being trans-
ported escaped to America.

—Mr. John Vattam, the London West as-

sessor has handed in the assessment rolls of the

village. Therein it is found that the total

value of the property assessed is \$325,530.

The population of the village is 1,875, as

compared with 1,864 at the last return,

making an increase of 11. The village

collects taxes on 102 canines, a large

number compared with the population.

During the year there were registered 35

births and 13 deaths.

—The annual meeting of the Canadian

Entomological Society will be held in their

rooms, Victoria Hall, next Wednesday, when

delegates, who are expected to arrive on

Tuesday evening, will be present from all

parts of the Dominion. On Wednesday

morning the usual council of members will

take place, and in the afternoon at 3 o'clock

business will be taken up. The evening

session, which will be of a public nature,

will commence at 8 o'clock, when it is ex-

pected that Mr. W. H. Harrington, of

Ottawa, president of the society, will deliver

his annual address. In addition to entom-

ology there are four branches of the

society, viz.: botany, ornithology, micro-

scopy and geology.

Rhea at the Grand.

Mlle. Rhea, the favorite French actress,
appeared at the Grand Saturday night be-
fore a large and well-dressed audience.
She appeared in her new play "The Queen
of Sheba," and it was somewhat of a dis-
appointment. The theme was too lofty
for the author's conception; the production
was oriental in form only and in spirit was
decidedly modern. It was an ordinary
drama clothed in purple and fin linen and
set in luxurious surroundings which
were foreign to its nature. But the acting,
the costumes, the stage pictures and the
music combined to make it a very interest-
ing performance. Rhea was as regal as
ever and looked every inch a queen. Her
leading man, Mr. Hart, is a handsome
young man, rather artificial in elocution
and action, but decidedly intelligent. His
King Hiram was picturesque and effective.
The other members of the company all
supported the principals and the audience
was well pleased.

On the Market.

The market Saturday was more than
usually impassable. The supply in almost
every department exceeded the demand. The
largest and finest assortment of meats which
has been seen this fall was on view. Lamb
was going at 7 cents by the carcass, veal at
6 cents and beef, per quarter, 4 to 5 1/2
cents. The ducks shown were more than
ordinarily large and fine. They were
quoted at 75 cents each. Chickens sold at
60 cents per pair. Some of the better
samples, of course, were higher. There was
a surplus of vegetables. A few of the
species on sale, with the prices are given:
cauliflower, each, 10 to 30 cents; toma-
atoes, peck, 25 cents; bush, 80 cents;
onions, peck, 25 cents; cabbage, each, 5
cents; celery, dozen, 40 cents; carrots,
beets and turnips were selling at 25 cents
per dozen. Fine potatoes were offered at
from 75 cents to 90 cents per bag. The
large amount of fruit presented many
appeals to the eye. Peaches and
Rogers, ten-pound basket, 20 cents;
Rogers, seventeen-pound basket, 30 cents.
Niagara grapes were priced the same. The
best peaches were selling at \$1.20 a bushel.
Apples, bushel, 25 cents; bag, 75
cents.
