Back From Rossland.

Principal Kirk Returns From the Mining Region.

Very Favorably Impressed-Not Many Going to Klondike.

Principal Kirk, of the Aberdeen school, has returned from British Columbia after an absence of about four weeks. It was Mr. Kirk's first visit to the mineral province, and he was favorably impressed. To an Advertiser reporter who called upon him this morning he gave a most interesting account of his experiences. Mr. Kirk spent most of his time in the vicinity of Golden and Windemere, East Kootenay, the richest mining district of province. He ventured on horse back 30 miles up among the mountatins during his visit at Windermere, and will ever remember the wild and rugged scenery along the route. The country, he says, is uninviting to the farmer, as it is purely a mineral country. Fruit is not grown at all excepting at some experimental stations where there are some small fruits grown successfully. The cost of living in East Kootenay, says, is about double what it is in

Ontario, and the impression one re-ceives of the country is that it is about as Ontario was 40 or 50 years About the Mineral King mine owned by a London syndicate, Mr. Kirk said the tunnel contained gold, silver, copper, lead, iron and antimony. It prom-

"Very few," Mr. Kirk replied. "They prefer staying where they have less for their work and more comforts than in that inhospitable and almost inaccessible place. Klondike can only accommodate 2,000 or 3,000 people, and there are nearly 100,000 there now.' He thought that although a couple of hundreds might leave British Columbia, the province would gain more by advertising than it would lose in pop-ulation. Klondike being in British possessions, the boom advertises all Canadian gold fields.
