RANDOM SHOT

John Stoneman Killed by a Man Who Was Loading a Gun. His Companion Was Also Wounded in the Neck.

[Special to The Advertiser per G.N.W.] Comber, Ont., Oct. 22.—John Stoneman, a young man living near the village of Staples, met almost instant death on Saturday.

He and Joseph Robins, another young man, were in a wagon, driving on the highway, when Stoneman received a charge of shot in his arm and breast.

Robins received a few stray shots in the neck, but suffered no inconvenience. Stoneman was conveyed home and a doctor summoned. It is not known to what extent he is injured.

The man with the gun, whose name could not be learned, was loading the weapon, when it went off accidentally, and was at close range.

THE PETROLEA SENSATION

Charge of Manslaughter Against Clarke Dismissed. [Special to Advertiser per G. N. W.] Petrolia, Ont., Oct. 22.—Police Magistrate Hammond gave out his verdict in the Clark manslaughter case this morning.

TEXAS FLOOD DAMAGES. Washington, Oct. 22.—Official reports of the damage to crops by the Texas floods and storms are as follows: Cotton, 68,000 bales, \$2,400,000; corn, 1,000,000 bushels, \$500,000; rice, 22,000 bushels, \$215,000; pecan nuts, 2,500,000 pounds, \$100,000. Also 1,300 horses, 150 mules, 20,000 cattle, 2,300 sheep, 500 hogs, total, \$490,000.
