

STILL ANOTHER BRITISH LOSS

Seven Killed, Nineteen Wounded,
Near Aliwal North.

Paris Shooting Affair a Brief Sensation—Magnanimous Japan—More Lawlessness at Peking.

London, July 18.—The South African casualty list issued last night, indicates that sharp fighting occurred July 14, near Zuurvlakte, 24 miles from Aliwal North. The British lost 7 killed and 2 officers and 17 men wounded.

A BRIEF SENSATION.

Paris, July 18.—The firing of a pistol shot at Pierre W. Baudin, minister of public works, while he was driving to a cabinet meeting on Tuesday by Madame Olzowsky, has proved a "one-day sensation." Explanations made today at the foreign office tend to diminish the sympathy for Madame Olzowsky and her husband, who say the act was committed in order to draw public attention to their poverty and misery. It appears the Olzowskys exaggerated the injury to their means of livelihood resulting from the arrest of Mr. Olzowsky in Italy, charged with being a spy, and for which Italy refused compensation, on the ground that the arrest took place under normal conditions. The foreign office treated Mr. Olzowsky well, giving him a position worth 5,000 francs a year. Instead of attending to his work himself, Mr. Olzowsky farmed it out to others, and thus reduced his income from it to 1,500 francs.

JAPAN'S MAGNANIMITY.

Washington, July 18.—In a special, which has aroused the keenest admiration of the state department, the Japanese Government has met the difficulty growing out of the preference of her request for an increase of her indemnity by withdrawing the request. The result is a substantial loss to Japan. She asked originally for \$23,000,000. It was fixed upon the idea that the money was to be made in cash by China. Confronted with the bond payment the Japanese Government asked that her allotment be increased to \$27,000,000 in bonds to make good the loss she would suffer through their sale. As soon as some of the other nations found that the allotment as originally fixed was in danger of being disturbed, they came forward with requests for special consideration. At least the United States commissioner at Peking has been instructed to give the assent of the United States to the decision of the proposition to increase the Chinese customs duties in order to provide means for the payment of the international indemnity. The American Government is still opposed to this project, and the instruction is sent only in deference to the universal wish for a speedy conclusion of the negotiations at Peking.

LAWLESSNESS AT PEKING.

Peking, July 18.—Disorder and lawlessness have greatly increased in Peking since the police of the city was restored to the Chinese authorities. There are nightly burglaries by large bands of depredators, while Chinamen in the employ of Europeans are continually beaten and robbed. The German military authorities here have arranged for the withdrawal of all German troops in Peking, except the permanent establishment early in August.

Story, had attended in shirt waists. When the sheriff had driven them out one of the excluded wagged another shirt waist man, he could not attend court without a coat. The man who accepted the bet was of short stature, and he stayed inside long enough to win before being observed.

KILLED TWENTY NATIVES.

ANOTHER COMBINE.
Philadelphia, July 18.—The manufacturers of upholstery fabrics have formed a preliminary organization with a view to merging their interests in one corporation. Practically the entire upholstery fabric industry is confined to Philadelphia, and 20 concerns, which it is now proposed to bring together, represent about 2,000 broad looms. The declared objects in uniting the interests are to bring about economies in the conduct of the business, to broaden the scope of the industry, and to prevent ruinous competition.

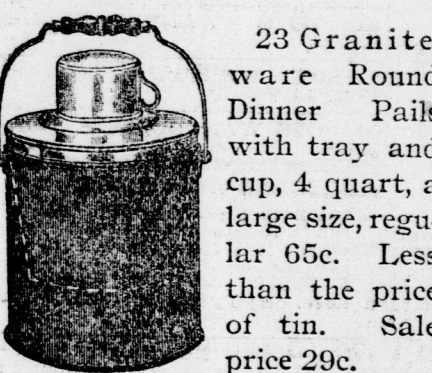

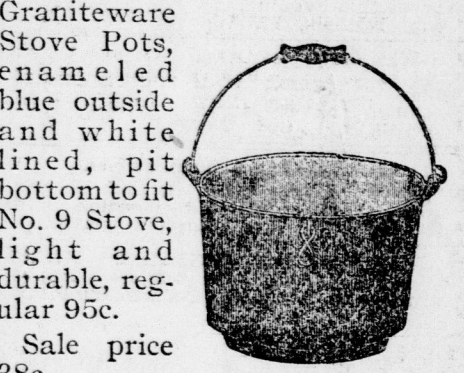
