THE CORONATION PROCEEDINGS
WILL BE MADE QUITE BRIEF

Increased Feeling of Uneasiness in London.

CEREMONY MAY BE DEFERRED

Various Explanations of the King's Condition Offered—One Is Re-
surgence of Malady.

London, July 29.—A coronation seats cannot be sold, even at reduced prices, and there is a steadily increasing feeling of uneasiness respecting the King's condition. Outwardly there is every indication that the coronation will occur in a fortnight. The medical bulletins are favorable, the rehearsals are in progress, proclamations have been posted, the processes of the re-decoration of the approaches to the abbey has been resumed and preparations are being made for the great naval review. Notwithstanding all these signs of optimism, there are persistent reports that the coronation will be deferred a second time.

THE QUEEN'S FEARS.

There are, unfortunately, strong reasons for believing that the Queen, the Prince of Wales and other members of the royal family are dreading the necessity for a second postponement, and yet are not prepared to assume the responsibility of advising it since they fear that the mental effect upon the patient will be serious. EARTHQUAKES
IN UNITED STATES

Lompere Valley, Cal., the
Scene of Violent Shocks.

DAKOTA AND IOWA RATTLED

Seismic Disturbances in St. Vincent
Island—6,000 People Fled by
the Government.

Lompere, Cal., July 28.—Lompere Valley experienced a severe earthquake shock at 10:55 last night. At that time a violent shock was felt, which lasted fully thirty seconds and was so severe that dishes, house plants and other articles were thrown from shelves. The people were stricken with terror and ran from their houses, some fearing to return, as other lighter shocks continued for several hours afterward. Another heavy shock was felt at 5 a.m., and one at 11 a.m. A large water tank was knocked over, the earth cracked at many different places and the San to Yaine River bed was slightly changed at places.

UNUSUALLY SEVERE.
Santa Barbara, Cal., July 28.—Alamog, 45 miles north of this place, report that an unusually severe shock of earthquake occurred about eleven o'clock last night doing damage to the property of the Western Union Company, estimated at from \$12,000 to \$15,000. At Harris station, on the railway, a fissure is reported to have opened, and from it a stream of water two feet deep and eighteen feet wide is now flowing. A slight shock of earthquake was felt in Santa Barbara shortly before 11 o'clock, but no damage was done.

IN OTHER STATES.
Yankton, S. D., July 28.—An earthquake shock occurred here this afternoon, lasting about twelve seconds. The shock was felt in the city and usual rumbling noises and moved northeast to southwest.

Omaha, Neb., July 28.—An earthquake, which was general over Nebraska, Iowa and Southern Dakota, occurred at noon today. The disturbance was felt in a large number of towns in the three states. No damage has been reported thus far, although the shock was sufficient to rattle dishes and to affect bell towers in some places.

SOUFIERRE VOLCANO ACTIVE.
Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, July 28.—The Soufriere volcano has been slightly in eruption twice since last Monday. A severe earthquake shock, accompanied by a tidal wave, affected the northeast point of the island, the latter washing over a fire-swept estate. No further damage was done.

Many people, both of the wealthier class and the laboring, are leaving the island, fearing disaster. The government is still feeding 6,000 persons. The settlement of refugees in huts on acquired lands in safe localities is progressing.

The Panama cable repair ship Newington, which is engaged in work 13 miles north of St. Vincent, reports that the depth of the sea there has increased to a mile and a quarter. Attempts to pick up the cable have been futile owing to unfavorable weather.

ONLY SUPERSTICIAL.

New York, July 28.—Dr. T. A. Jaggar, of Harvard, in a letter dated Fort de France, July 7, says there has been no active eruption of Mount Pelee of importance since June 5.

A great cone of bowlders and volcanic bombs, heaped within the fissure

will justify their own conduct in misleading the nation. Their apprehensions may not be well founded, but it will not be a startling surprise for the public if a second postponement be announced in the course of the week.

THE KING'S CONDITION.

Various explanations of the King's conditions are offered. One is that there are symptoms of a renaissance of the malady. Another is that the wound is not healing properly, and that blood-poisoning is feared. Another is that the King's physicians, having found it necessary to comply with the patient's wishes respecting an early date for the coronation, are now ready to admit that they have overestimated his recuperative powers and yet are unwilling to disappoint him.

A REDUCED CEREMONIAL.

The list of explanations involves the theory that the King will be crowned as a final resource, but with a greatly reduced ceremonial adapted to the requirements of an invalid incapable of enduring any prolonged strain, fatigue, or excitement. The King, according to this forecast, will not drive with the Queen from the palace to the abbey, but will join her from the Confessors' Chapel, and only remain in sight during a few passages of the ceremonial. Whatever may be the truth respecting the King's condition, the coronation is not accepted as a foregone conclusion. The most hopeful thing about it is that there is a general impression that it will not occur, and consequently that the unexpected is likely to happen.

AFTER CORONATION.

Soon after the coronation, Aug. 9, their majesties will go to Balmoral Castle and remain there for a few weeks. The air there is expected greatly to assist the King to recuperate.

Occasionally there are sudden slides of debris down this cone into the deep gorges of the Riviere Blanche. At night these slides of red hot rocks make a glowing stream.

The phenomenon is merely a superficial one. As at St. Vincent, the many mud spouts, steam jets and local craters that have been reported are all superfluous, caused by rainwater draining into the beds of hot, dry gravel.

GREAT OVATION
TO THE PREMIERS

Who Were Guests of City of
Glasgow on Monday.

HON. GEORGE W. ROSS PRESENT

Premier Barton Says the British
Empire Is Large Enough—Consolidation Now Needed.

Glasgow, July 29.—All the colonial premiers, with the exception of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Prime Minister of Canada, who is in London, were given a great ovation here yesterday.

Mr. Barton, the Premier of the Commonwealth of Australia, in one of the many speeches he delivered in the course of the day, warned his hearers that the British Empire was large enough, and that Britons now ought to look to consolidation rather than to acquisition.

George W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, declared that the war in South Africa was prolonged to the extent it had been because there were so few colonial troops in the field.

Richard J. Seddon, Premier of New Zealand, said that the colonies have already proved that they love the motherland by sending their sons to fight in South Africa. They wished to go further, and give the mother country trade preference over other nations, but too much attention was being paid to what continental nations might think. What the colonies and Great Britain should do was to join in common cause to meet American competition. Should this be done, the result need not be feared, Mr. Seddon said, since the British workmen and manufacturers were unequalled in the whole world.

THE PROVINCIAL PREMIERS.
Premier Peters of Prince Edward Island, who returned from England in recognition of the zeal with which Mr. Robertson has evinced for Masonry, and the important services he has rendered, the rank and dignity of past grand junior warden of England, he conferred upon him. It is understood that Mr. Robertson has accepted the honor, which is the highest past rank conferred by the grand lodge of England.

EUROPEAN CROPS.
The Mark Lane Express, in its review of crop conditions says that wind and rain threaten serious damage over a considerable portion of the wheat area of the United Kingdom. Barley has benefited by the weather and oats have not suffered.

The French wheat yield is above the average in the most important provinces, the total crop being estimated at 42,000,000 quarters. Rye is not above the average, but oats are from 5 to 10 per cent above.

A big wheat crop is reported in Hungary and more than an average yield is expected in North Germany, Saxony, Bavaria and Silesia.

"DIAVOLO" HUH!
The American bicyclist, "Diavolo," sustained a nasty fall while performing the feat of looping the loop at the London Aquarium on Monday. He was much bruised, but will recover today.

YERKES' RAILWAY SCHEME.
The parliamentary committee dealing with Charles T. Yerkes' proposed transportation system for London, elicited the fact that only £2,000,000 out of £5,000,000 capital of the new district road is held in America. Mr. Yerkes testified that it was his intention to give the British workman as much of the electrification work as possible, and to buy all materials in England, except the ironwork, which would come from Germany. He believed twopenny should be the universal underground fare for the metropolis.

RAVAGES OF CHOLERA.
Deaths from cholera in Manchuria between July 15 and July 23 numbered 108 Russians and 576 Chinese. There were 35 new cases of cholera and 38 deaths from the disease in Cairo on Sunday. In Moucha, 10 new cases and 21 deaths were reported.
