DAMAGES CLAIMED BY BOTH WIVES

Wanstead Victim Twice Mar ried and Each Wife Wants Compensation.

Among those killed in the Grand Trunk accident at Wanstead on Dec. 26, 1902, was Wilson Morton, of Toronto and Chicago. Annie F. Morton, of To-ronto, and Maud Morton, of Hamilton, each of whom declared she was his widow, claimed damages for his death The Grand Trunk then asked the naster-in-chambers at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, to consolidate the cases, or else to decide which woman had the prior right as Morton's widow. In his judgment yesterday the master declined to consolidate, holding there was no rule for such a course, and told the

Grand Trunk that it must decide for

itself, which litigant should apply for indemnity.

The claimants must sue separately. the master says, and then he adds: "So far as I can see, the Grand Trunk must determine upon the lawful widow. Then, if any settlement is made, it can be pleaded in the other action, and that plaintiff must es tablish her claim as best she can. "I might say that Annie F. Morton admittedly Morton's first wife. The claim of the second wife is based on a divorce granted in Cook county, Illinois, but the first wife disputes the validity of the separation on the ground that no rotice had been given her. From this it would seem that Maud Morton would have to establish

the validity of the divorce before she could prove claim." 
Council Awards a 'Phone Franchise to the Canadian Machine Company.

The company is to have their system in SUNREAM OIL, wires on the principal business streets are to be placed underground. The price for business 'phones is not to exceed \$20 per year, and for residences \$15. A business man may have one 'phone in his place of business and one at his residence for \$30 per year. The

company agrees to equip and maintain the system in a modern manner. This is the first municipality in Canada in which the company has applied for a franchise. The agreement will be ratified by the council this week and the company will immediately commence work in the installation of the system, which does away with the

necessity for operators.

The factory of the company is located n Toronto, where a 200 'phone section is now in operation. The entrance of this latter concern into the arena makes four telephone companies who are looking to do business in Canada—the Bell Telephone Company, the Canadian Telegraph and Telephone Company, the Canadian Machine Telephone Company and the Stark Electrical Company of Toronto.
