DAMAGE IS REPORTED FROM THE NORTH

Vivid Display of Lightning Last Night—Rain Was Heavy for Awhile.

The thunderstorm last night was quite severe, and the lightning very vivid, but the damage done was very slight.

While it rained very heavy here for a short time between 9 and 10 o'clock, the worst of the storm passed over the city.

The play of the lightning was particularly vivid north, and some damage is reported from that district.

The Bell Telephone Company's wires were put out of business in that section, and many connections broken. Locally the crops suffered practically no damage.

A wire of the street railway on the South London Belt Line went down in the storm, and traffic was delayed for upwards of an hour.

Long after the rain had passed and the stars were shining overhead an extremely striking electrical display could be viewed in almost any direction. The lightning was of the heat variety, and not particularly dangerous.

Friends of Edwin Hawley are quoted in the World as admitting that a syndicate of bankers said to be headed by J. P. Morgan & Co. have taken over 50,000 shares of Chesapeake and Ohio stock, bought by them since the Pennsylvania Railroad and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. parted with their interest. Mr. Hawley's control, however, is said to remain intact.

Chesapeake and Ohio has recently sold as high as \$2, and the pool is said to have bought at an average above \$1.50. Lately a decline set in. Under repeated drives the stock touched \$1.50 yesterday. Support developed and the price rallied to 70.

THIRTEEN STRIKEBREAKERS ARRESTED AT TUNNEL TOWN

 Sarnia, Aug. 4.—Thirteen strikebreakers appeared in court this evening on a charge of breaking the alien labor law, and were remanded for a further hearing, which may take place tomorrow. The men, fourteen in number, came through the tunnel yesterday, and when stopped by the Dominion immigration officials were found to have the necessary amount of cash to permit of their entering Canada. Later, however, the officials who had followed up the case, found that the men had no money. Thirteen of them were at once placed under arrest, one man having disappeared.

ROWLAND WIRELESS TELLS SAFE ARRIVAL

His Party Reaches Indian Harbor With the Yale, Wedding Gift to Dr. Grenfell.

"Indian Harbor, "Via Cape Race, N. F., Aug. 2.
 "George Rowland, Greenwich, Conn.: "Arrived safely. How are you all?"
"GEORGE ROWLAND."

This is the message flashed by wireless from Indian Harbor, Labrador, telling of the safe arrival of the daring young Yale man who had the 40-foot hospital tender Yale built along lines suggested by himself, raised the cost of construction by personal subscription and with a crew of students took the boat from Booth Bay, Me., along some of the worst coast in the world and turned it over to Dr. Grenfell, Labrador missionary, as a wedding present to be used in the Labrador work.

Rowland, who is 21, is a son of Mr. George Rowland, a New York business man, whose country house is at Greenwich, Conn., and a brother of the late, Vice-President Smith. Yellowgrass pointed out was the product of labor applied to nature. The manufacturer is entitled to the wealth the factory produces or the product of his own labor.

But the address continued, the manufacturer steps in and says: I must have also as much as I can get from the other fellow. The farmer says: If you appropriate my earnings you are a thief. Now, manufacturers are all honorable men, and do not like the thought of being called thieves and robbers, so they went to Sir John Macdonald, then in Opposition, and waiting a chance to be reinstated as premier.

Sir John said: "I shall wipe out the words thief and robber and put protection in their place."

This was a serious injustice. If it is wrong to rob, it is wrong to make robbery legal.

The address proceeded to congratulate and thank Sir Wilfrid for what he had done since attaining power, notably, preferential trade with Britain, and added: "We do not underestimate what you have done, nor are we ungrateful, but when we expected you to lay the axe to the root of the tree and cut it down you only cut off some branches. Now, if it was wrong for the Government of Macdonald to pass this law, is it not also wrong for your Government to perpetuate it as a whole or in part? We are happy to know you admire the British free trade policy, and regard Britain in this respect as the light of the world. We appeal to you for relief and redress."

"We admired you when you stepped back, after earnest efforts, and said the next proposal must come from the United States, and set about opening up other markets for us. President Taft now asks for closer trade relations, and we hope the Government will be able to secure for us the advantages of this valuable market."

"As free men, we sternly object to paying tribute to our fellow-citizens. We ask no favors. We urge our rights. We are willing to pay our share towards the revenues of the country. We are free men. Treat us as such. If we are slaves we ask our freedom. If refused, we must demand. Our resources are not exhausted. Our appeal is to you, Sir Wilfrid."

This meeting of farmers rose and cheered the address. The Premier, in replying, reiterated his personal adherence to free trade. All the progress he looked for had not yet been made, but the claims of the grain growers would be fully gone into. He stated the Government's readiness to discuss reciprocity with the United States on the latter's advance on a broader basis. The tributes of the address to the British fiscal policy Sir Wilfrid held to be justified. But Britain had obtained her prominent position after a long and arduous struggle, he said, "but she has passed in results and permanency those who have sought to effect reform by revolution." He repeated his assurance that the tariff commission would go fully into the matter. "We are not yet satisfied with the results attained," was his observation.

CREW IN MUTINY TERRORIZE WOMEN

Captain of Ore Steamer Fights Sailors to Protect Guests of Steel Trust.

Chicago, Aug. 4.—When the big ore steamer Douglass Houghton came into the harbor at Gary, Ind., yesterday, she had a mutiny of men and women aboard. Six of the mutineers were in chains, bearing scars of conflict and five ladies, guests of the steel trust, were terrified and frantic. The captain, a man of great courage, was standing off with a revolver. The ore boat was on her return from a special trip and the young women were making their annual trip to Duluth. The party consisted of Miss Cecilia Kirk, Miss Cleo McCusky, Miss Louise Maxwell, Miss Edith Anderson and Mrs. Louis Maxwell. The boat was 100 miles off Gary harbor when the trouble started. Just what caused the row no one was prepared to say but it is agreed that Peter Peterson, a sailor, began it by smashing a piece of the boat's furniture. He was ordered locked up and later released by other members of the crew.

A PRINCE FOR THE POLE

Henry of Prussia Says He Will Make Careful Inquiry First.

Berlin, Aug. 4.—Prince Henry of Prussia, who is a member of the Zepplin preliminary Arctic expedition party now headed for Spitzbergen to study conditions for the proposed Zepplin dirigible balloon expedition to the North Pole, states today in a message from Tromsø, Norway, that it is the intention of the promoters to attempt to reach the pole before a full preliminary investigation has been made.

No start by balloon will be attempted before a most complete knowledge of conditions in the ice world, bearing on the features of the expedition, such as the nature of the polar air currents, the possibilities of landing upon the ice fields, etc., has been ascertained. It may, said the prince, "be five to ten years before the expedition, attaining the pole by air route, will be reached. Then, too, the main object of the enterprise is scientific, not a mere pole hunt."

BIU MOTOR BOAT DAY FOR MAPLE CITY

Detroiters To Be Entertained on Saturday by Chathamites.

 Chatham, Aug. 4.—Arrangements are under way for a grand reception to the Detroit Motor Boat Club when they visit Chatham on Saturday, on the occasion of their annual cruise. The board of trade, the Automobile Club and the Chatham Motor Boat Club have combined to make the visit of the Detroiters a big event. It will be a big event for the Detroit motor boat people, but for the citizens of Chatham as well.

One hundred and fifty power boats will comprise the fleet which will leave Detroit at 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning. The fleet will be led by Commodore W. E. Scripps, in his flagship Narmada, and each boat will be appropriately decorated and will carry a Canadian flag at the bow and American flag at the stern. The Hornet, the fastest motor boat in Detroit, will accompany the fleet. Mayor Brett, myer, of Detroit, will come with the fleet, and immediately upon landing he will deliver an address at Tecumseh Park.

The club will bring \$1,500 worth of fireworks with them, and a monster fireworks display will be given on Tecumseh Park on Saturday evening. These fireworks have been donated by a Cincinnati manufacturer, who supplied the fireworks display for the Elks' demonstration in Detroit.

During their stay here the Detroiters will be taken around the city in automobiles by members of the Automobile Club. The Chatham motor boat owners will meet the fleet at the mouth of the river and escort them to this point. That the annual cruise of the Detroit Motor Boat Club to Chatham is an event of importance to the motor world is evidenced by the fact that several of the foremost motor boat and sporting magazines in Canada and the United States have contracted for photos and stories of the cruise.

Perhaps the greatest destruction occurred around the farm of Mr. P. McCallum, of Gladstone, over 100 feet long, was left a complete wreck. It was erected three years ago, and stood on a cement and brick foundation. The barn was carried off its foundation and completely ruined. Nine cattle were in the wreck, but seven were taken out and two killed. Fifty-seven loads of hay were destroyed, and many new implements. No insurance was carried on the building.

Another big loss was L. A. Ward. Twenty acres of oats, 10 acres of corn and about 15 acres of corn were completely destroyed. His barn was struck but no damage done.
