Capt. Guiness Wished Success in Canadian Mission.

INVITATION TO CANUCKS

Commander of Grand Fleet Appeals for Men Foom the Dominion to Join Navy.

Hon. Rupert Guinness of the royal avy, who is conducting a campaign or recruits for the navy, will address he Canadian Club at a luncheon on Friday at noon, and will also speak at a meeting to be held in the Masonic Temple on Friday evening. He will probably arrive in London on Thursday evening and will spend some time visiting here.

A dispatch from Toronto received by The Advertiser today contains a message from Sir John Jellicoe, com-mander of the grand fleet.

The dispatch raads: Hon. Rupert Guinness who is conucting a campaign in Canada for recruits for the imperial navy has re eived the following appeal from Ad-miral Sir John Jellicoe, in command the grand fleet:
. M. S. Iron Duke:

Dear Capt. Guinness,-I wish you all access in your mission to Canada and el sure the response of the Dominion of the call of the imperial navy will al, in proportion, that granted r oonse given by Canada to the Empire the declaration of war.
I give you the following message to


