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FIND GEORGE CYR GUILTY OF MURDER

Bracebridge Jury Return Verdict After Three-Hour Deliberation.

BRACEBRIDGE, Ont., Feb. 15.—George Cyr, a young French-Canadian, was late tonight found guilty by a jury of the murder of Mrs. Andrew Solave, in the township of Chaffey, nine miles from Huntsville, on Dec. 13, last.

The case was given to the jury at 8 o'clock, and the verdict was returned at 11 o'clock. Mr. Justice Middleton will pronounce sentence later.

The prisoner and his mother were the only witnesses for the defence. Cyr gave the jury a detailed account of all his movements on the day of the shooting, and declared he had not been near the Solave home. He also affirmed he had never owned or carried a revolver in his life.

The crown then produced three witnesses who swore they had seen Cyr with a revolver. Mrs. Cyr declared her son was at home at the time the shooting was said to have taken place.

Cyr was indicted on three counts, namely, shooting and killing George Winters, killing Mrs. Andrew Solave, and shooting Andrew Solave with intent.

Mrs. Solave was found in her home with a bullet wound in her back. The story told by her husband was that on his return home from the bush, accompanied by Winters, they met Cyr coming out of the house with a revolver in his hand, and that Cyr immediately opened fire on them.

Winters later died of his wounds.

SHOOT'S WIFE, MOTHER, THEN ENDS OWN LIFE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 15.—George A. Boden, attorney, shot and killed his wife, Mary Boden, 37 years of age, and her mother, Mrs. Julia Taylor, 66, and then ended his own life today in his wife's home here.

Failure to effect a reconciliation with his wife, who had sued for divorce, was indicated as the cause of the triple tragedy, police say.

REICHTAG BACKS WIRTH.

BERLIN, Feb. 15.—The Reichstag today voted confidence in the government of Chancellor Wirth. The vote was 239 to 185.

BEDARD FACES MURDER TRIAL

Guelph Prisoner Formally Committed To Appear At Assizes Opening Monday.

TURNKEY GIVES EVIDENCE

George Everson Tells His Story of Attack On Governor McNab.

Special to London Advertiser.

GUELPH, Feb. 15.—John Bedard, alleged murderer of Governor John McNab, late of the county jail, was today formally committed for trial at the assizes which will open at the court house on Monday next before Mr. Justice R. W. Meredith. The preliminary hearing was held before Magistrate Watt at the police court, C. W. Bell, K.C., Hamilton, is defending Bedard.

Turnkey George Everson, called as a witness, told the story of going into the corridor a few minutes after 5 o'clock on the evening of Thanksgiving Day with the meal for Bedard, McArdle and Hobson, and with Governor McNab directly behind him. As soon as he got inside of the corridor he was attacked by McArdle, who grabbed him by the throat, and at the same time time Hobson grabbed McNab by the throat and got him backed up against the open door.

Did Not See Blow Struck.

The witness did not see Bedard strike anybody, but he heard Mr. McNab cry out: "Don't kill me." He also stated that as he was getting the better of McArdle the latter called out: "He's got me, boys, slug him," and it was at that time that he received the wounds on his head

and cheek from some one, but he could not tell who it was, as his back was turned. He was told later by Mr. McNab that it was "Frenchy," as Bedard was known, who did the slugging.

Mr. Kearns produced the top of the tap which is alleged to have been used by the accused man in doing the "slugging," and he identified it as having come from the opposite corridor, which was occupied by Cook and Wallace. He swore that the cloth with which it was covered came from a sheet or a pillow slip, and that he found several strips of a similar material in Bedard's cell afterwards. He did not find the tap himself, but it was picked up by Mr. McNab soon after the assault took place.

Mr. Everson was very closely cross-examined by Mr. Bell, but he made no change in his story, admitting that he did not see Bedard strike the late governor.

Chief Rae Testifies.

Chief Rae was called, and told of his being present at the bedside of Mr. McNab at St. Joseph's Hospital, when the latter made his dying declaration, and when he said that he could not last much longer. This statement was placed in evidence, and was to the effect that Mr. Mc-

Nab, believing he was about to die, said that he was "slugged" by the accused as he was held by Hobson. This statement was taken on Tuesday afternoon, and death occurred on Thursday.

Two doctors testified their belief that the assault hastened the death of Mr. McNab, though Dr. Lindsay admitted in cross-examination that deceased had been under treatment by him for Bright's disease for some three years, that his weight was not up to normal, and that he was weaker than usual due to kidney trouble, loss of appetite, high blood pressure and other symptoms.

ARREST LONDON MAN.

WINDSOR, Feb. 15.—Arthur Carrier, engineer, is held here by police. He was arrested by provincial police on a warrant said to have been issued at London.

HAMILTON, Feb. 15.—Olive Routledge of Trenton, who came here a week ago from St. Catharines, committed suicide here this afternoon by leaping from the seventh story window of the head office of the Bank of Hamilton on King street.

Her hurrying body, which struck the pavement with a sickening thud, narrowly missed striking pedestrians.

At noon the woman called at Frank Morrison's office, in the Bank of Hamilton Chambers. Mr. Morrison was out, but the caller told his stenographer she wished to see him on legal business and could wait.

While the stenographer's attention was momentarily diverted the woman raised the window, and before the horrified stenographer could halt her, she had stepped onto the ledge and dived head first to the street 140 feet below.

REPORT 10,000 IN REVOLT IN INDIA

BOMBAY, Feb. 15.—Unconfirmed reports reached here today to the effect that the Bhil tribesmen are engaged in an outbreak, fomented by followers of Mohandas K. Gandhi, Indian Nationalist leader, in the Etawah Jungle district near Godhra.

The Bhils, who have a notorious record for lawlessness, are said to have been incited by the Banias, the merchant class, who exercise considerable influence in this district.

DOCK WORK RESUMED.
