Premier Lloyd George Tells Commons Country May Now Work Out Own Salvation.

ABOLISH MARTIAL LAW

Security of Empire's Rights and Communications Safeguarded Under Terms.

Press Cable).-Prime Minister David premier, had admitted the difficulty Lloyd George announced in the House of reconciling these interests with of Commons this afternoon that the British protectorate over Egypt has been terminated and that Egypt now is free to work out such national institutions as may be suited to the aspirations of her people.

He explained that martial law had been used not to enforce the British policy upon Egypt but as a main instrument of government in the hands of the Egyptian ministers for certain important measures arising out of the war conditions.

An act of indemnity, therefore, would be necessary before any government could dispense with martial

Face No Obstacles.

Mr. Lloyd George declared that it was for the Egyptian government pass the necessary legislation, in the way of which "we undertake to place no obstacle, provided the final clause of the government's declaration is duly observed."

The final clause defines the special relations between the British government and Egypt, and declares that the following four matters are absoitely reserved to the discretion of the British government:

"First-Security of the communications of the British empire in "Second-Defence of Egypt against

all foreign aggression or interference direct or indirect.
"Third—Protection of the foreign interests of Egypt and protection of minorities.

Fourth-We are prepared to make an agreement with the Egyptian government in a spirit of mutual accommodation whenever a favorable op-portunity arises for the conclusion of such an agreement. But until such an agreement, satisfactory to our selves and to the Egyptian govern-ment has been concluded, the status quo will remain intact."

Resent Protectorate.

Mr. Lloyd George said it had long been recognized that the protectorate was no longer a satisfactory form of relationship between the British Empire and Egypt, but owing to the peculiar geographical position of Egypt, the protectorate could not be terminated unless the British im-

The efforts of any Egyptian government in this direction would always, he said, enjoy the sympathy and support of the British government.


