GREAT BRITAIN'S PROTECTORATE IN EGYPT ENDS

Premier Lloyd George Tells
Commons Country May Now
Work Out Own Salvation.

ABOLISH MARTIAL LAW

Security of Empire's Rights
and Communications Safe-
guarded Under Terms.

LONDON, Feb. 28. — (Canadian
Press Cable).—Prime Minister David
Lloyd George announced in the House
of Commons this afternoon that the
British protectorate over Egypt has
been terminated and that Egypt now
is free to work out such national in-
stitutions as may be suited to the
aspirations of her people.

At the same time Mr. Lloyd George
revealed the terms upon which the
British Government will give Egypt
the opportunity of working out her
own salvation.

He said a government white paper
would show the house what had taken
place since the declaration of the
policy of the British Government last
December after the failure of the
Egyptian mission to London led by
Adly Yaghien Pasha. The paper also
would contain, he added, the declar-
ation of policy on which the govern-
ment, in accordance with the prin-
ciples laid down in December, now
proposed to proceed.

Martial law will be abolished in
Egypt as soon as an act of indemnity
has been passed, the premier an-
nounced. He explained that martial
law had been used not to enforce the
British policy upon Egypt but as a
main instrument of government in
the hands of the Egyptian ministers
for certain important measures arising
out of the war conditions.

An act of indemnity, therefore,
would be necessary before any govern-
ment could dispense with martial law.

Face No Obstacles.
Mr. Lloyd George declared that
it was for the Egyptian government
to pass the necessary legislation, in
the way of which "we undertake to
place no obstacle, provided the final
clause of the government's declara-
tion is duly observed."

The final clause defines the special
relations between the British govern-
ment and Egypt, and declares that
the following four matters are abso-
lutely reserved to the discretion of the
British government:

"First—Security of the communi-
cations of the British empire in Egypt.
"Second—Defence of Egypt against
all foreign aggression or interference
direct or indirect.
"Third—Protection of the foreign
interests of Egypt and protection of
minorities.
"Fourth—We are prepared to make
an agreement with the Egyptian gov-
ernment in a spirit of mutual accom-
modation whenever a favorable op-
portunity arises for the conclusion of
such an agreement. But until such
an agreement, satisfactory to our-
selves and to the Egyptian govern-
ment has been concluded, the status
quo will remain intact."

Resent Protectorate.
Mr. Lloyd George said it had long
been recognized that the protector-
ate was no longer a satisfactory
form of relationship between the
British Empire and Egypt, but owing
to the peculiar geographical position
of Egypt, the protectorate could not
be terminated unless the British im-

perial interests were fully safeguard-
ed. Adly Pasha, former Egyptian
premier, had admitted the difficulty
of reconciling these interests with
Egyptian aspirations, added the
prime minister at the time of his
visit last summer.

At present, continued Mr. Lloyd
George, there was no Egyptian gov-
ernment which could go so far as to
commit its country to a relationship
with Great Britain of a nature to af-
ford Great Britain adequate safe-
guards in these matters, and the gov-
ernment had therefore determined to
proceed by an unilateral declaration
in which it enjoyed the wholehearted
support of Field-Marshal Lord Alen-
by, British high commissioner in
Egypt, and the officials of all ranks
in the service of the Egyptian gov-
ernment.

The premier said, with reference to
the special relations between Great
Britain and Egypt, defined in the four
clauses set forth:

"Foreign powers are not concerned,
and we propose to state this unmis-
takeably when the termination of
the protectorate is notified by us."

The premier added that the wel-

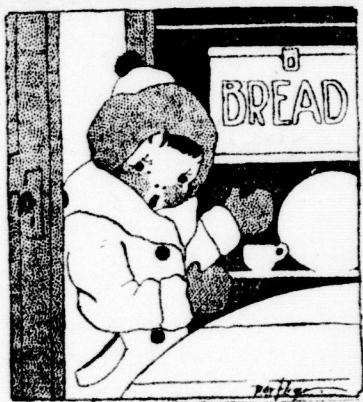
fare and integrity of Egypt was
necessary to the peace and safety of
the British Empire, and the govern-
ment could not permit its special re-
lations to be questioned by any other
power. It would regard as an un-
friendly act any attempt at inter-
ference in the affairs of Egypt by an-
other country, and it would consider
any aggression against the territory
of Egypt as an act to be repelled by
all means at its command.
Mr. Lloyd George said that of
course Great Britain would accept
protection for foreign interests and
minorities in Egypt as a "responsi-
bility inseparable from the special
position we claim in that country."
He instanced cases during the last
few years in which foreigners were
protected, and he expressed the hope
that with the recognition of their
status as an independent nation the
Egyptians would recognize how im-
perative it was to keep passions
within proper bounds. The efforts of
any Egyptian government in this di-
rection would always, he said, enjoy
the sympathy and support of the
British government.
