

TO APPEAL DECISION AGAINST ANTI-BETTING ACT

NICKLE ANNOUNCES STANCE ON FINDING

Judge Denton Holds Ontario Betting Information Act Ultra Vires.

ACTION IS INVITED

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Aug. 16.—The decision of County Court Judge Denton delivered today holding that the Ontario betting information act is ultra vires of the legislature will be appealed, Attorney-General Hon. W. F. Nickle announced in Kingston this evening, after being informed of the Toronto judge's finding.

When handing down his judgment today, Judge Denton at the same time dismissed charges against Samuel Lichtman and Minnie Lichtman of unlawfully publishing betting information. Other charges pending in Toronto, it is understood, will not be dealt with until judgment on the validity of the act has been given by a higher court.

The action of Judge Denton has given rise to considerable discussion as to the question of matters pending the appeal. Judge Denton made it clear in the presentation of his judgment that an appeal was invited, and that it was understood that the act would be stated if required. It is understood, however, that no request for a stated case, which would come before another court, will be made, the simple and most direct way of dealing with the question being to take the case to the appellate division at Osgoode Hall on the certificate of the attorney-general. Such action cannot be taken until Sept. 17, when the court convenes.

Legally Law Valid.

In the meantime the question is being asked: Could prosecutions be instituted pending an appeal? The answer to this is that legally the law must be looked upon as valid, but that it is extremely unlikely that any further information would be laid, or if they were, that any magistrate would deal with them.

It is very probable that a police magistrate has declared an act ultra vires, and the opinion was freely expressed by prominent lawyers tonight that the judgment had not been given without considerable delay into a mass of precedent, and that the court of appeal would uphold the judgment.

In this case, the act to all intents and purposes would be washed off the statute books, leaving action to be taken under the provisions of the criminal code, which makes no restrictions on Ontario publications.

Declines Decision. Chief of Police Dickson of Toronto declined tonight to say what attitude he would take in the event of further violations of the act.

All newspapers meantime are thrown upon their own decisions. Should Judge Denton's decision be upheld publication of betting information would be legal, but if it were reversed they would be liable to conviction under the terms of the act. It is alleged that certain racing papers published here will continue to appear as they have since the date the act became law.

A legal opinion is of the belief that, while convictions are still possible, local magistrates may be chary about delivering sentences, and the act will regard Judge Denton's decision as the law of the province until such time as final judgment is given by the appellate division.

TAKES ACTION TO STOP GERMANY'S GOLD LOAN

Reparations Commission Reserves Priority Rights Against Fund.

Special to The Advertiser. Paris, Aug. 16.—The commission of reparations in session here today, took action to prevent Germany's proposed international gold loan to stabilize finances and settle the wage question.

With the British delegate abstaining, the commission decided to notify Germany that inasmuch as Berlin had not asked permission to float the loan, the commission expressly reserved priority rights against any fund assigned by Germany to pay interest upon or repay a capital loan, particularly if the receipts were not applied to the discharge of the country's reparations obligations.

NORFOLK FARMERS SAY CROP RETURNS ARE HIGH

Rye is turning out exceptionally well and oats are also making a good showing, but wheat is only about half a crop on account of the severe winter.

Those who are growing Golden Bantam corn and Golden Wax beans for the canning factory have the pickers hard at work in their fields, as these crops are both doing well in spite of the dry weather. The cucumber growers are also working overtime, as this crop has to be handled quickly. Tobacco is coming on rapidly now, notwithstanding the late start it got in the spring. The large acreage of late potatoes is looking well, though rain would be very beneficial.

GIVE COMMUNITY PLAY EXHIBITION

Students of Guelph Summer School Demonstrate Group Games At O. A. C.

Guelph, Aug. 16.—The proper method of conducting a community play day was demonstrated by the students attending the summer school for rural leadership in session at the Ontario Agricultural College on Wednesday afternoon. A good number from Guelph and surrounding districts attended.

THE SESSION CLOSES

The company was divided into a number of large groups, each under a special play leader, and the following group games were properly demonstrated and then played and enjoyed by all. Dodgeball, basketball, relay, baseball, passing game, steal the bride, in-and-out relay race, spoke tag, and attention.

Following the group games the visitors were treated to a fine exhibition of softball baseball, when two picked teams from the ministerial students of the school clashed in battle royal. The match was refereed by Rev. T. De Courcy Rayner of Watford, and the game was won by Rev. E. W. Brearley of Mount Elgin, the final score being 17 to 8. The batteries were Rayner and G. H. Kelly; Brearley, Cotton and Johnston.

The evening session commenced, as usual, with community singing, following which the speaker of the evening was introduced, W. J. Karr, B.A., D. Paed., director of rural school organization, Ontario Department of Education. Mr. Karr gave an instructive lecture on "Consolidated and Continuation Schools," in which he claimed that consolidated schools are the only ones that can be expected to replace the smaller schools, which are in poor condition and sadly out of date.

The following morning this morning was conducted by Rev. J. S. Stevenson of Stroud, who gave a talk on "Leadership." Rev. P. W. Roberts of King read the Scripture lesson, while Rev. C. N. Paddon of Milverton, Rev. J. W. Arnott of Kleinburg, Rev. C. J. Scofield of Victoria, Rev. W. M. Sterling of Cedar Springs, and Rev. H. Cotton of Guelph, assisted in the devotion. Miss Emily Mann of Scotland presided at the piano.

Lecture on Genetics. The first lecture hour of the morning was taken up by Prof. J. W. MacArthur, Ph.D., of the department of biology, University of Toronto, who delivered the closing lecture of his series on "Genetics." Continuing his discussion of the Mendelian mode of transmission through heredity, he traced this rule in its workings through the human species, showing the transmission of the dominant eye of feeble mindedness, and of vicious tendencies on the one hand, and of the better mental qualities on the other hand, according to percentage.

This evening the closing session of the school was held, a fine demonstration of the gramophone and its place in school life and work. Vocal and instrumental selections were given by members of the summer school, which has now closed its ninth annual session, is becoming an increasingly important factor, not only in the development of an intelligent and trained rural leadership, but also in working through its students towards the betterment of living conditions and the religious and economically in many districts in rural Ontario.

ONTARIO'S CABINET HAS NO OPPOSITION

Premier and Nine Ministers Are Returned by Acclamation.

MERELY FORMALITY

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Aug. 16.—The final stage in the formal constitution of the Ferguson Cabinet was passed today when all its members were returned by acclamation at the ministerial nominations. The nomination proceedings were duly carried out, in spite of the barrenness of their results in furnishing any contests.

Premier Ferguson's choice of his executive colleagues went unchallenged. Nine ministers who hold portfolios and who hence receive emoluments under the crown were required to again seek the indorsement of their constituents. Although the absence of any opposition had been almost unmistakably indicated prior to the nomination day, the election law had to take its course and the ministers affected were forced, consequently, to endure monotony if not suspense, until the 12 o'clock vote was taken. By 4 o'clock Chief Election Officer Allan Dymond at the Parliament Buildings was in receipt of the returns, which showed that the entire cabinet had been returned without opposition.

Formal Waiting. According to despatches received from the ridings, proceedings were uniformly apathetic. Premier Ferguson and his cabinet ministers alike experienced merely the formal waiting, after which they were entitled to consider themselves to have again successfully emerged from the ordeal of last June, however, the tameness of yesterday was distinctly an anti-climax.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson's administration will be the sixteenth of Ontario, it consists of nine ministers with portfolios and of four without. Hon. Thomas Crawford, Northeast Toronto; Dr. Leeming Carr, Hamilton; Sir Adam Beck, London; and Hon. J. R. Cooke, North Hastings.

Consumption of Gasoline INCREASES IN AMERICA

New York, Aug. 16.—Gasoline stocks held in American refineries were drawn on to the extent of 1,205,119 barrels during July, according to reports made to the American Petroleum Institute covering about 67 per cent of the operating refinery capacity of the United States. Doherty Says Wheat Pool Will Save Prairie Farmer; Denies He Plans To Resign

Special to The Advertiser by a Staff Correspondent. Chatham, Aug. 16.—Speaking to over 5,000 people at a U.F.O. picnic at Government Park, Kent County, Hon. Manning R. Doherty, M. L. A., minister of agriculture in the Drury government, stated that the establishment of a co-operative wheat pool would be the saving of the prairie provinces, and that if it is conducted in a purely co-operative way it will be an outstanding success.

Continuing his remarks, Doherty said: "The man who labors hard should receive his due share for the expenditures involved." Continuing he said: "Western farmers can never prosper until the wheat speculators and their Bolshevistic methods are kicked out of the country. Speculators in farm produce are ruinous to the better producers throughout Canada."

Concerning his views on the political situation in Ontario, Manning Doherty says: "The new government of Ontario has one of the hardest tasks to face of any government for several decades. Their scope for service to the people is practically limited. Never in the history of the province have such opportunities been given to a government to make good."

In speaking of the stand which he expects to take when the legislative meets again he said: "The members of the new government have several excellent openings to render a first-class service to the people. If they do all that is clean and good for the people of this province, I will pledge them my hearty support, especially in their agricultural program."

Speaking of the late government he stated that the most outstanding service which it rendered was in showing the farmers the importance of their work and prestige in the province. In this connection he referred especially to the splendid organization of dairymen, honey producers, tobacco growers, and the fruit and berry growing associations.

In referring to the wheat pool, Doherty took time to deny a rumor to the effect that he is about to resign from the political arena.

"I will remain a member until you put me out," he said.

"The gross unfitness, costly blindness and vanity of would-be leaders should afford a lasting lesson to organized workers," Clynes said. "At the same time," he said, "the dockers' strike involves a lesson for the employers who regard wage reduction as a cure for industrial and economic troubles."
