## **TOPPING BLAMES KILLING** ON OLD IMBEDDED BULLET

Tells Lawyer That Ball Buried in Skull Brings On Spells.

RESULT OF SUICIDE

Swanson Thinks Prisoner Is Suffering Under a Strange Delusion.

Clarence Topping, who is now in Middlesex County jail awaiting trial for the murder of his sweetheart, Geraldine Durston, told his attorney, D. A. J. Swanson, K.C., of Oshawa, yesterday afternoon that the bullet with which he tried to end his life

some years ago was still embedded in his skull.

According to Mr. Swanson, Topping stated that he suffered from severe headaches, and he blamed it on his attempt at suicide in Strathrow three years ago. He told the roy three years ago. He told the lawyer to feel the side of his head, behind the left temple, where a small lump was apparent. This, about the size of a large pea, he stated, was the bullet which had entered when he shot himself. It was tered when he shot himself. It was fits of depression and passion.

Mr. Swanson stated that he did not think that the bullet was still there,

but that Topping was suffering under a delusion.

The lawyer also stated that when he saw Topping at the jail yesterday every courtesy was given him.


