Should China Be Humbled the Czar Would Have Plausible Excuse for Interference.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—A Shanghai dispatch says that to day the Japanese made a second attempt to disperse the Chinese fleet at Wei-Hai-Wei, on the Chinese coast, and thus gain access to that port. After an obstinate fight they were compelled to retire. No details of the losses of the Chinese or the Japanese in this or in Thursday's naval encounter can be obtained.
