

THE NOMINATIONS.

Honors With the Government—Conservative Leaders Confident of Results on Polling Day.

Four Elections by Acclamation—Three of Them in Quebec and One in Ontario.

OTTAWA, June 17.—(Special)—Nomination day leaves the honors with the government. Rogers, the Patron returned by acclamation, states that he is going to parliament to support Patron interests. Outside of that he will support the Tupper administration. Mr. Dupont is an unflinching Conservative; Mr. Bernier is a Liberal acceptable to the government, while Beausoleil was a Liberal, but has formally withdrawn his assent to Mr. Laurier's policy. From the Atlantic seaboard to the Territories encouraging reports of the great victory which the government will secure next Tuesday are being daily received. Toronto, June 17.—(Special)—An investigation of the nominations in Ontario shows that only three constituencies are without Conservative nominees, namely, W. Elgin, Oxford and West Huron. THE MAIL AND EMPIRE, discussing the acclamations yesterday, says: "There were four elections by acclamation yesterday, three in Quebec and one in Ontario. In Quebec, Dupont, Conservative, was retained for Bagot; Mr. Dupont has sat in the house some years and is one of the rising men. M. Bernier, Liberal, who voted against Laurier on the remedial question, has been elected in St. Hyacinthe. This constituency is a live, the Liberal majority averaging 500. In Bertier, Beausoleil, Liberal, in the last parliament, who broke from Mr. Laurier towards the end of the session and who is now opposed to him and his boodle element and Tarte, was unopposed. He is practically a Conservative. The only election by acclamation in Ontario was Frontenac, where Rogers, Patron, was returned. The Liberals here did not put up a man. Rogers is an old-time Conservative and in hearty sympathy with the National Policy. The Conservatives have no reason to be otherwise than satisfied with the day's work."

WINNIPEG, June 17.—"Down East," said an Ottawa gentleman this morning. "The Conservatives are counting on a majority of at least twenty-five in Quebec; a substantial majority from the maritime provinces; a big surprise for the Liberals in Ontario; and a sweep in the West. The party leaders whom I have seen in Ottawa are very confident. There is no doubt of the government's return."

DOMINION POLITICS.

Scenes of Enthusiasm Attend the Meetings in Ontario Addressed by the Premier.

Sir Oliver Mowat Falls to Fill the Bill Before a Montreal Audience.

BRANTFORD, June 17.—(Special)—Niagara Falls, Thorold, St. Catharines and Brantford were the places at which Sir Charles Tupper spoke yesterday, and the scenes of enthusiasm which have marked every meeting held by the Premier since he recommenced his tour, were repeated. In Brantford, where the Premier spoke last night, and which hitherto has had the reputation of being a Liberal stronghold, the demonstration given to Sir Charles and his colleagues, Dr. Montague, indicates an overwhelming revision of feeling amongst the electors. Four thousand people were crowded into the drill hall, while nearly four thousand more failed to secure admittance.

MONTREAL, June 17.—(Special)—A demonstration in honor of Hon. Wilfred Laurier and Sir Oliver Mowat was held in the Duluth street rink on Monday night, and was attended by about a thousand people. The Liberal leader had lost his voice, and spoke only about fifteen minutes, when Sir Oliver was introduced. The meeting was exclusively French-Canadian, and as the "little premier" has been presented to the masses as "the Saviour of their race" and high up in the honor roll of national celebrities, there was immense disappointment when he began to speak English and could be heard only by about two hundred and understood by half that number. "En Francais!" was heard from all parts of the hall, and Mr. Laurier had to appeal to French politeness to give Sir Oliver a hearing. He spoke for about 20 minutes and told of Mr. Laurier's coming victory, and said he would be happy to take office after June 23.

TORONTO, June 17.—(Special)—Samuel Platt, the Conservative candidate for West York, has received a letter from Sir Charles Tupper stating that although he had nothing to do with placing Mr. Platt in the field against Clarke Wallace, he was not surprised that the support of the government had done it. Mr. Platt is going into the constituencies and endeavoring to defeat not only the supporters but members of the government. Sir Charles adds that under the circumstances he can only wish Mr. Platt success in his efforts to prevent any gentleman taking such active measures against the government of which he (Sir Charles) is the head.

KINGSTON, June 17.—(Special)—Rev. Principal Shaw, L.L.D. of the Wesleyan College, of Montreal, is in the city. In an interview he said he was not a partisan in politics, but that it was clear to him that whether Sir Charles Tupper or Mr. Laurier be premier, concessions must be made to the Roman Catholic minority of Manitoba.

NEWFOUNDLAND MATTERS.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 16.—The steamer Alaska, bound for Tit Cove with a cargo of copper ore, was caught in the ice floes and had her bow and sides crushed. She reached port in a damaged condition and will require redocking to render her seaworthy again. The schooner Edith was found abandoned off Cape Bonavista, and it is feared that her crew of seven have perished. The government intends to introduce a measure to enforce statute labor throughout the colony. It is announced that the surplus of last week is now being shown to be largely over estimated.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

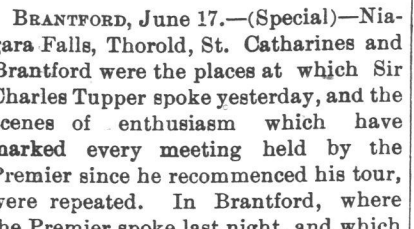

REOPENED TO THE CARS

Tram Service Resumed This Morning on James Bay Bridge Under New Regulations.

The City Council Decide to Erect a Pile-Carried Structure at Point Ellice.

As a result of yesterday's special meeting of the City Council, tramcar service across the James Bay bridge will be resumed this morning under new and explicit regulations for the preservation of the public safety, and at the same time the work of constructing a new bridge over Victoria Arm, just to the south of the Point Ellice bridge, will be initiated. The new structure will be carried by copper-covered piles, and reserved for pedestrians and ordinary vehicular traffic only—not tram cars. Six weeks or two months at the latest will be required for its completion, and the cost, according to an estimate formed by the City Engineer, will be in the neighborhood of \$2,200,000.

It was for the purpose of further discussing the subject of permanently restoring the place of four alternative propositions of the city disconnected by the accident to the Point Ellice bridge that yesterday's meeting was held. The Mayor presided, and Aldermen Williams, Macmillan, Humphrey, Marchant and Glover formed the board. The discussion was opened by the Mayor, who stated that the merits and demerits of each of which were debated at length by the council, were presented to the residents of Victoria West.

The latter course was eventually decided upon, though temporary permission is granted to cross over the railway bridge may be sought until the new bridge is completed, as a matter of convenience to the residents of Victoria West.

In connection with the catastrophe at Point Ellice bridge, notice was formally given by Ald. Partridge that at the next meeting of the council he will move "that the Mayor be requested to obtain forthwith the opinion of Sir Christopher Robinson, C.B., of Toronto, or other eminent counsel, as to the position and liability of the city with regard to the Point Ellice bridge disaster, and when such opinion is obtained to instruct the city solicitor to be governed thereby."

In regard to the desirability of reopening the James Bay bridge to tram car traffic a conference had been held in the morning between the representatives of the Consolidated Electric Railway Co. and the special committee of the council. The outcome of this interview was reported to the council meeting later in the day, being embodied in a communication from the company's solicitors, in which it was proposed to cross the bridge with the smaller cars only; to carry in each not more than 80 people while crossing the bridge; to run the cars while on the bridge at a speed not greater than four miles per hour; and to allow a distance between cars of not less than 200 feet.

These regulations were accepted by the council without prejudice to the rights and claims of the city, and the barricades against the cars, in so far as at least as James Bay bridge is concerned, will be removed forthwith.

Several communications next came before the council in the usual course, one of these being from Mr. H. Dallas Helmcken, M.P.P., pointing out the danger and inconvenience to pedestrians in crossing the foot bridge by the present dilapidated foot bridge on

the Songhees reservation. As the work of constructing a new bridge has already been commenced this letter was ordered to be acknowledged and filed.

One member of the board in passing, complained that city bicyclists—three that the knew of—were making a practice of riding at breakneck speed over this frail foot bridge, to the great danger of themselves and pedestrians.

In reply to this Ald. Glover, who is himself a cyclist, directed the board to have a look at the bridge. The most expert wheelman would hardly venture to speed over a bridge where his riding space is confined to a plank twelve inches wide.

The final business of the day was the passing of reports from the streets and the finance committees, the latter including the bills of the city undertakers for the interment of victims of the bridge disaster.

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
