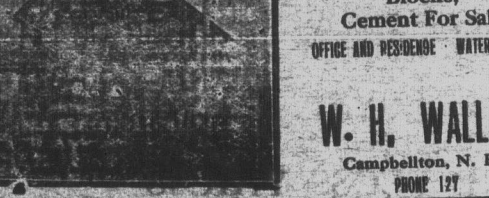

THE WORLD AT WAR

The Greatest Struggle of the Ages—What It Demonstrates and Teaches Concerning Drink—A Remarkable Record of Temperance Progress

The heart of all civilization aches to-day, as it watches the upheaval of devastation, cruelty, misery and slaughter with which Europe is shaken and torn. Yet out of the awful carnage flash gleams of heroism that compel admiration, and of facts that are very instructive, while the motives and events which evoked them are deplored. The Kingdom of Belgium has made for herself a place in the world's records of glory and fame, and will be spoken of while history lasts as an example of heroic loyalty to that truth and honor that are the foundations of civilization.

Stepping down from the high plane of moral purposes and action to the broad level of material fact, we have a demonstration in what is going on of the soundness of scientific teaching concerning alcoholic liquors, and the wisdom of the plans and proposals of temperance reformers, while on the other hand there is a demonstration of the depths to which alcoholic indulgence can sink humanity. The rightness of the prohibition principle is acknowledged in Imperial edicts and Parliamentary action. The dehumanizing effects of alcoholic indulgence are shown in conduct of which it would be hard to believe demons to be capable. A few facts regarding both of these matters will be instructive.

Promptly following the outbreak of war the British Parliament passed an Act giving Licensing Justices special power to restrict the sale, consumption and supplying of intoxicating liquors in licensed premises and clubs. True to innate selfishness, regardless of all patriotic motive or principle, the liquor traffic fought the Government proposals and succeeded to some extent in weakening their force, but the Act went through giving authorities greater power than before to be closed, except during such hours as may be specified in the order. Acting promptly on the authority conferred, the Chief Commissioner of Police of London, at the request of the General Officer commanding the military forces in the London district, called upon the Licensing Justices to close all liquor-selling places, including clubs, at 11 p.m., and this is now done. In the request the General Officer said "that many of the reservists and young soldiers who came from the country where the hours of closing are earlier are lavishly treated to drink by the civilians," and "that the result has been a quite disproportionate amount of drunkenness among the men of the reserved battalions." This, it was pointed out, "not only adversely affects both discipline and training, but is prejudicial to successful recruiting."

In many other places similar action was taken by local authorities. Then came Lord Kitchener's advice to the soldiers going to the front, in which he warned them against the dangers of drink indulgence and his insisting that no presence of drink would be allowed to be sent to the troops in active service.

When the war broke out the sale of absinthe was at once prohibited in France. The Kingdom of Norway, although not at war, prohibited all brewing and distilling because of its waste of food materials, and most progressive of all, the Russian Government suppressed the whole liquor traffic for one month as a temporary measure. Before the month expired the vast benefits of the change led to a public demand for the extension of the prohibition, in favor of which there was a mighty demonstration in Petrograd on August 30th.

The penalties for violation of this Russian prohibition were made very extreme. Any person selling spirits was liable to a fine of \$15,000. This suppression of the traffic, it must be borne in mind, was the deliberate surrender of a vast amount of national revenue at a time when it was badly needed, for in Russia the traffic is a Government monopoly, and all the profits of it are taken for Government purposes, and the Government is very much in need of revenue just now.
