

Toronto.
Toronto, Oct. 29.—With heavy receipts of live stock at the local markets to-day, containing a large proportion of common grade cattle, trade was somewhat slow in all lines of stock and common cattle were slightly lower. A few choice heavy steers sold at \$8.35 for Montreal consumption and other choice cattle fetched from \$6 to \$8.15; medium cattle were a slow sale, but held their own in the quotation column. Drivers who had common cattle to sell were not so fortunate, as prices dropped on them about 20c. to 40c. per 100 pounds. Milkers and springers continued strong and feeders and stockers were also firm at \$5.70 for best short-keep feeders. Sheep and lambs were practically unchanged, but hogs dropped 20c. Receipts at the two markets totaled 165 loads, 3,011 cattle, 131 calves, 765 hogs and 2,310 sheep and lambs.

1. The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Watford has constructed as local improvements certain sidewalks on the west side of Wall Street from North side of Front Street to South side of Simcoe Street and crossings on said West side of Wall Street at Huron Street, at Ontario Street, at Erie Street and at St. Clair Street.

2. On South side of Simcoe Street between Wall Street and McGregor Street:
On West side of Huron Street from West side of McGregor Street to West Boundary of Lot Number 82 on said Street.
On East side of John Street from Huron Street to St. Clair Street.
On East side of said John Street from Simcoe Street to North Street (4th line S.E.R.) and crossings on said East side of said Street at Scollie, St. Clair, Erie, Simcoe and Victoria Streets.

3. On West side of John Street from Erie to St. Clair Streets and crossings on said West side of John Street at Erie and St. Clair Streets and crossings on the North side from West to East side of said Street at Erie Street.

On North side of Gold Street from Main Street to West Boundary of Lot 141 on said Street.
On South side of Main Street from Main Street to West Street.
