Third Annual Meeting Held in the Demonstration Building on Thursday Evening

The third annual meeting of the Lawrence town Branch of the Maritime Library Association, was held in the Demonstration Building, Thursday evening, November 10th, 1921.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather the attendance was good. President Dr. J. B. Hall in the chair. Meeting opened with two choruses: "Oh! Canada," and "My Own Canadian Home." Mrs. R. J. Shaffner, pianist.

Minutes of last annual meeting read and stood as recorded. Rev. H. T. Jones then favored with a solo, which was much enjoyed. After which the following reports were read:

(Sgt.) Mrs. W. E. Palfrey, Treasurer. Rev. H. T. Jones, Convener of Book Committee, gave a stirring address. Spoke of books as friends, and strongly recommended the reading of such books whose friendship would be helpful, stimulating to a higher life, rather than belittling our ideals. It was the regret of the committee that more money had not been available for procuring new books.

Mrs. J. B. Hall, Librarian, reported not only sustained interest, but progress. 1100 books in Library—beside the monthly magazines, Literary Digest, National Geographic, Canadian Popular Mechanic, MacLean, Good Housekeeping, and other magazines. Books well kept and promptly returned.

Suggested that for those outside the Lawrence town school section that the time limit for keeping books without fine be three weeks.

Deferred to the lunches served by the ladies each library afternoon during the winter months as being not only a source of income but creating a social atmosphere. Moved by Rev. A. H. Whitman and seconded by Mr. A. J. Wilson that these reports be adopted. Carried.

Mr. J. A. Beckwith, of Berwick, favored us with a solo which gave much pleasure to the audience.

The chairman, Dr. J. B. Hall, then briefly addressed the meeting, thanking the officers for their faithful services rendered during the year. Further spoke as to the aim of the Library, not merely to give passing entertainment to its readers, but particularly to give to the boys and girls the reading of such books that would help them to become men and women of which Lawrence town, or any other town, might justly be proud. Suggested that to stimulate the reading of solid books we have four social evenings, during the winter. One to be devoted to Scott and his writings, another to Dickens, third Educational evening, and fourth Local Improvement. The suggestion was subsequently adopted by the meeting. Nominating committee appointed as follows: Messrs. P. G. Palfrey, A. J. Wilson, J. W. Elliott, M. Daniels and Dr. L. R. Morse. Before they retired Mr. P. G. Palfrey spoke words of appreciation of two of our interested and active late members, Mr. J. E. Shaffner and Mr. A. H. Bishop. Moving that the association extend to both bereaved families its sincerest sympathy in the great loss sustained by them.

It was expected that the Rev. C. W. Robbins, of Bridgetown, would be the speaker of the evening, but fate decreed otherwise and instead we listened with much interest and pleasure to an address by Rev. A. H. Whitman, of Lawrence town. Mr. Whitman followed along the line of thought expressed by the other speakers, urging the necessity of cultivating a taste for the heavier lines of reading, such as Histories, Biographies, etc., mixing with them the lighter reading so that we might not become mental dyspeptics. (Experimental Farms Note)

Timothy is, like all other cultivated grasses, a very variable plant; that is to say, a very large number of different forms exist. As an illustration it may be mentioned that the writer, some ten years ago, collected several hundred different forms in two days in one single locality. These forms differ from each other in respect to mode of growth, leafiness, and other characters upon which their relative agricultural value might depend, as well as in respect to time of maturing, weight of seed, etc. In view of this tremendous variation, it is obvious that it is possible to develop, through selective breeding
